

MOTORISTS TO TREAT ORPHANS

Will Provide Outing at Springbank For About 200 Kiddies.

League To Place Angle Parking Signs On Streets.

London Motor League will give its annual outing to the orphans of the city orphanages on Friday, July 28. It is expected that some 150 to 200 orphans will be accommodated. A motor trip around the city will be held, and then the children will be taken to Springbank Park, where refreshments will be served. The outing will be under the direction of C. E. Bernard, secretary of the motor league. The details of the outing were arranged at a meeting of the directors of the motor league Thursday afternoon.

It was also decided at the meeting that the league should place angle parking signs on all the streets where angle parking is to be enforced under the new city bylaw.

The location of the angle parking areas of the bylaw are the east sides of sections of Talbot, Clarence and Wellington streets, and south side of Carling street.

It is the purpose of the bylaw that by having motorists park their cars at an angle more room will be provided. No parking is allowed on the west side of these streets. White lines will be drawn by the city authorities at the corners of the sections of the streets, where angle parking only is permissible.

The directors also decided to have direction signs, pointing the way to the tourists' camping grounds at Wonderland Park, on the way to Springbank, placed at different points along the roads in the neighborhood.

It was also determined to write to City Engineer Brazier to see if some repairing could not be done on that section of Dundas street east between the end of the pavement and the Ontario Hospital. This road is very rough at the present time.

UNABLE TO FIND SCHOOL ROOM FOR EAST LONDON

Trustee Rice and Inspector Greer to Resume Search for Increased Accommodation.

Once again the question of classroom accommodation for public school students in southeast London threatens to occupy the limelight again.

No new school is possible for that district until next Easter at the earliest, Trustee Rev. A. B. Rice, chairman of No. 2 committee, and Senior School Inspector V. K. Greer set out recently to comb the locality in question for suitable buildings that could be converted into temporary classrooms.

They report that their efforts have not been crowned with any great success, and Chairman Rice declares that the search will be resumed, although it is doubtful if any reasonable location will be secured other than the basement of the Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church, with a seating capacity of 60 pupils.

Inspector Greer, while not entirely satisfied with the "find," admits that it is the best yet encountered. The church managers offer to make certain alterations, and set the rental figure at \$175 a month for a ten-month lease. The majority of the trustees view this sum with certain misgivings, terming it a trifle extravagant.

"You could almost build a one-room school for that money," \$1,750, essays Trustee Harry Hayman.

SUGGEST MANY SITES FOR SCHOOL

Since members of the board of education and their officials have stressed the advisability of purchasing suitable school sites for future use, officers to sell have been received at the office of the secretary of the board.

E. J. Thornton suggests his property on the Wharfedale road for a possible site for a South London high school. His communication has been referred to Trustee A. E. Silverwood and committee.

At this moment the trustees have one South London school site in their possession, which still awaits the final approval, however, of the provincial authorities.

TOMORROW'S DOINGS.

SATURDAY—English, McCormick's and McClary's picnics at Springbank.

AFTER SPENDING a three weeks' vacation at Ojibway, Muskoka, William Doherty, chief dispatcher of the London division of the Grand Trunk Railway, returned to the city Thursday.

CITY CLERK S. BAKER has received notification from the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board that the above body has authorized construction of a railway siding to accommodate the London Shipping Containers Company in this city.

NO. 1 COMMITTEE of the city council has authorized debentures for \$3,500, requested by the board of education for the technical school. Of this amount, \$4,000 is to cover cost of equipment and the remainder is architect's fees.

SPECIAL EVANGELISTIC services are to be conducted in the City Mission Sunday night, July 23, by Bert Lewis. Since moving into the new quarters, 604 Dundas street, the meetings have been attracting a large attendance, both of children and adults.

D. R. McHARG, car distributor of the London division of the Grand Trunk Railway, will leave Friday night for a two weeks' vacation in Winnipeg and Brandon. During Mr. McHarg's absence the position will be filled by E. L. Goodwin, chief operator.

APPROVAL of additional railway siding accommodation at the Western Fair Association at Queen's Park has been received by City Clerk S. Baker from the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board. An interesting feature of this matter is the fact that although approval has only recently been received the new tracks were completed some time ago.

W. G. WRIGHT & SONS have written to City Clerk S. Baker asking him to purchase a lot at the fact that, through an error, employees of that firm have "unlawfully paid taxes," according to the city clerk, and requesting a refund. The above civic official stated that while he is at a loss to discover the means of refunding the appellants, he will refer the communication to No. 1 committee of the city council for instructions.

NINETY-SIX building permits have been issued in London this month, the total cost of construction involved being estimated at \$153,185. Building Inspector A. M. Piper issued permits Thursday to A. S. McGregor to construct a one-story brick veneer residence at 283 Kitchener avenue to cost \$2,500.

STILL HELD in custody at the Middlesex County jail on a charge of cruelty to animals, Philip Richards of London is scheduled for his initial hearing Saturday morning next before Magistrate A. H. Hawkshaw in the Middlesex County court. The charge was preferred by George Tustin, provincial humane inspector, who reports that the horse involved has since died as the result, he avers, of inhuman treatment accorded by the defendant.

LONDON WILL BID FOR CONVENTION

Buoyed up by the close race London ran with Toronto in the vote for the site of the 1923 convention of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the province of Ontario, at Port Arthur Wednesday, at this year's meeting, the Chamber of Commerce is determined to put up a strong fight again next year to have the meeting in London in 1924. London lost by a vote of 536 to 516 in favor of Toronto.

Several other conventions are being asked for by the chamber at the present time, some of which will likely come to London during the fall.

Quite a few conventions have already been held this year in London through the efforts of the chamber, and many more are expected to come.

EXTEND WELCOME TO CHAUTAUQUA

Mayor Cameron Wilson is extending a civic welcome to the Dominion Chautauqua Friday night, when the first evening entertainment is being given, on request of Mrs. E. B. Smith, regent of the Municipal Chapter, I. O. E. under the auspices of which the course is being presented here this season. Rev. J. F. Reynolds, pastor of the First Methodist Church, is introducing Prof. John Duxbury, known as "England's greatest reciter." Ferguson's operatic quintet is presenting scenes from "Martha," in costume, with stage setting, at 8:15 o'clock.

FAILS TO RECORD SECOND-HAND DEAL

Jacob Fox in Court Over Transaction Involving Stolen Rifle.

"You can't play fast and loose both as a pawnbroker and a second-hand man," Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett told Jacob Fox, King street, who was charged in police court Friday morning with a breach of the second-hand act. Fox was charged with failing to enter a deal in connection with a rifle, stolen from the Army Service Corps at Carling Heights, in his books. Judgment was reserved until Monday.

Detective Egleton told of going to Fox's shop Saturday, accompanied by Capt. Cook, of the Ordnance Corps, to find a Lee-Enfield rifle, which had been stolen from the heights. They could not find any entry on the second-hand books or on the stubs of the pawn book.

Then they took Fox to the military school and he identified the man who had brought the rifle, which was in his window, to his shop.

This man, McAdams, was sentenced to 30 days in police court a few days ago after pleading guilty to the theft.

Fox claimed he took the rifle in as a pledge. The man, McAdams, he said, brought a suit to his store, and later wanted to go to a dance, and gave the rifle as security so that he could get the suit out. Later, Fox claimed, McAdams, who also gave the name of Scott, instructed him to sell the rifle.

When asked if he had entered the transaction in connection with the suit in his books, Fox replied that he had entered it in the second-hand book. He did not have the book with him, but when Detective Egleton obtained it and brought it to court, Fox was unable to find the entry.

He produced a pawn stub to show he had obtained the rifle from a man named Scott on July 4.

Seek To Recover Saxophone From Pawn-Shop

McPHILLIPS VS. FOX.

THOMAS FOX, Clarence street, pawnbroker, is the defendant in one of more than 40 cases claiming the attention of the first division court, now in progress at the Middlesex court house, with His Honor Judge A. I. Taylor of Sarnia presiding.

It would appear that March 26, last, a certain resident of the city entered Fox's well-known place of business armed with a saxophone, seeking to dispose of the same for a reasonable amount. A deal was effected, it is recorded, and the instrument changed hands.

Then came representatives of the McPhillips Company, dealers in such articles of merchandise, holding that the property is still to be considered theirs, owing to the fact, they allege, that the same was sold by them on the installment plan, but again sold by the purchaser before he had made all payments.

The dispute seems to center chiefly about the claim by Fox that the complainants declined to furnish serial numbers of the instrument they have claimed to have sold.

As the case was still in progress Friday afternoon it is fully expected that the sitting of the court will continue until Saturday.

OHIO VISITORS LOUD IN PRAISE OF WONDERLAND

C. O. Wood and Family of Canton, O., First to Stay at Tourists' Camp.

Bidding fair to advertise the Forest City far more effectively than by any method yet attempted, the civic tourists' camp at Wonderland opened Thursday has witnessed its first party of visitors.

Arriving from the east Thursday at 7 p.m., C. O. Wood of Canton, Ohio, with his wife and two children, George and Mrs. Wood, had their ground leaving Friday at 9 a.m. for Sarnia, en route for Fort Wayne, Indiana.

So impressed were the travelers with the camping facilities at Wonderland and the natural beauty of Springbank and the surrounding locality that Mr. and Mrs. Wood had their plans to arrive at their destination Saturday, would have lingered a day or two longer.

As a camp, Wonderland was the most ideal spot that they have encountered since they commenced their tour from Ohio two weeks ago, they stated. They were fervent in their praise of citizens who would furnish without cost such excellent facilities for passing strangers, and contrasted the grounds with other camps where they have remained overnight, lauding London's site as the best yet by far.

FINES SLAUGHT \$100 FOR HAVING DRUGS

For having drugs in his possession illegally, Walter Slaughter was fined \$100 and costs with the option of three months in jail by Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett in police court Friday.

The defendant was found guilty of the charge on the evidence of Constable Thomas McMaster and Daniel Love, although the drug was not produced in court. Both the officer and Love testified Slaughter had white powder on his trousers after he and the officer had struggled for a while in an envelope, which contained the powder.

The defendant declared the envelope contained boric acid.

"You might as well spill water on a man and then convict of having liquor," commented Albert M. Judd, counsel for defence, who intends to appeal the case.

WILL DEED LAND FOR KEEP IN HOME

City officials are in a quandary regarding the disposition of an aged indigent in London. The indigent wishes to become an inmate of the Aged People's Home, and owns property in this city, and a farm of several hundred acres in the county, which he is willing to deed to the city for maintenance of the home.

However, investigation has revealed the fact that the property within the city and the farm belongs to the indigent in name only, as they are "mortgaged to the hilt." Pending discovery of a further source of funds, the case is being held up, as the man's condition is not such as to make the case an urgent one.

LAUDS KIWANIAN IDEAL OF SERVICE

Lauding the Kiwanian ideal of service and their work for the underprivileged boy, Rev. W. Goetz of St. Thomas, spoke to the Kiwanian Club Friday afternoon.

He urged upon the Kiwanians that they throw themselves into the work which they undertook under the service ideal, and in doing so bring to themselves a reawakening of life and interest in life.

London Youngsters Form Junior City Administration For Chautauqua Week

Within the four walls of the big Chautauqua tent on the collegiate institute grounds Friday morning was organized a new city.

With all the ceremony which attends a municipal election, members of the Junior Chautauqua municipality met and elected their civic officers, mayor, city clerk, chief of police, police force and public service commission.

Under the supervision of Miss Lily Coburn, the young citizens will live throughout the Chautauqua week, bowing to the mandate of John Fox, the newly appointed mayor of Chautauqua city, and every morning from 9 to 11 they will be governed by the laws of the newly-formed corporation.

Marion Smith was elected city clerk; Charles Ashwell, chief of police, while Fred Smith, William Fox, Francis Hodges and Helen Galbraith form the police force.

GEN. KING VISITS KI-Y BOYS' CAMP

Speaks to Lads On Discipline and Character Building.

Beautifully situated amid a grove of cotton ball trees on the flats of Elmer Sage's farm, with the cooling waters of the Thames a few rods away, the annual Ki-Y camp has attracted more than 80 boys and leaders, and for the next three weeks joy and sport will reign supreme and care-free, sunburned boys will frolic on the only sand beach this side of Port Stanley.

The camp, which is under the joint administration of the Kiwanis Club and the Young Men's Christian Association of this city, is conducted for the express purpose of developing health and character in the younger boy.

Lloyd Houlding, boys' secretary of the "K," who is camp director, has with him an efficient staff, and the extensive program leaves not a dull moment in the entire three weeks.

Among the personnel are Stanley Howard of the Bank of Montreal; Stanley Alvor, church organist of St. Thomas; Mr. Battle, signalling instructor; Mr. Rayden, instructor in first aid and Red Cross work; Ronald Foot, who is teaching the boys radio with the Y. M. C. A. set, and Leslie Gray, Douglass Walker, Ted Westlake, tent leaders.

The entertainment of the lads is one of the chief concerns of the camp staff. Baseball, volleyball, quoits, boxing, wrestling and aquatic sports keep the boys busy from 7 o'clock in the morning till 9 at night.

Thursday morning the boys received a visit from Brig.-Gen. W. B. M. King, C.M.G., D.S.O., commander of Military District No. 1, who addressed a large gathering on "Discipline and Character Building." The camp is also visited daily by several Kiwanians, who invariably participate in the fun with the lads.

LORDS CONSIDER REFORM SCHEME

Crawford States Strong Opinion Against Any Changes Prevalis.

LONDON, July 20.—(By Canadian Press Cable.)—Another sitting of the House of Lords today was devoted to consideration of the House of Lords reform resolutions and the absence of any enthusiasm for the proposals marked as in the previous discussion. The voices of those who think matters should be left as they are, are beginning to be heard.

Lord Crawford, who was the government spokesman today, warned Lord Selborne and others who are seeking a material modification of the parliament act that there is a strong body of opinion against any change.

The first exponent of this opinion was Lord Buxton, who wanted to know why they should reform the House of Lords at the present time. He declared that the House of Lords carried more prestige and weight now than it did before the parliament act was adopted, and was often a truer exponent of public opinion than the House of Commons.

DEMANDS BOOST IN TRACK ASSESSMENT

London \$5,000 per mile is the valuation placed upon it. If necessary, expert engineers can be called in to determine the value of the tracks. By special tracks, I mean interconnections and switches.

To obtain an estimate of the proportion of curved and special tracks owned in London by the company was one of my reasons for asking that a measurement be made," concluded Ald. Douglass. "Now that the error has been discovered I have gained my point."

"I do not know what action the city council will take on my recommendations, but I expect they will suggest that the assessment valuations go more deeply into the assessment independent of the special civic commission appointed by the council to investigate the London street railway and other local transportation systems."

Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant desires to point out that no blame can be attached to his department, because of the error in mileage made on the London Street Railway Company return.

"I sent the company a letter last March asking for the total mileage of tracks in London, and it left no loophole for a mistake," said Mr. Grant. "I accepted their report in good faith, just as I do each year from the Grand Trunk and C. P. R. I will bring the error to the attention of the court of revision tonight, and ask the members to authorize me to collect taxes on the actual mileage as shown by the city engineer's measurement."

TO ASK GOVERNMENTS TO STOP LIQUOR SMUGGLING

Sons of Temperance Decides On Affiliation With Civil Council of Canada.

Sydney, N. S., July 21.—Amalgamation of the Sons of Temperance was favored by the national division in session here today, and affiliation with the civil council of Canada was decided upon.

A committee was appointed to confer with a committee of the Templars with a view of formulating an acceptable basis of union. The opinion was expressed that more efficient work could be done for the temperance cause through a union of the two bodies.

It was also decided yesterday that the national division would ask the governments of the United States, Canada, Mexico and France to take such steps as would end international smuggling of intoxicating liquors between St. Pierre, Mexico, the West Indies, Canada and the United States.

OPENS DANCE HALL AT WARDSVILLE

WARDSVILLE, July 20.—Wednesday evening Robert Yates opened his dance hall to the public. A large number attended, coming from Strathroy, Florence and the surrounding country.

Mr. Yates is giving his new hall to the public free for dancing, etc. He has put in a piano, lighted the building with hydro, and has seating accommodation both inside and out.

Court Clerk Unwittingly Doubles Bail

It was the intention of Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett in police court Friday morning to allow William L. Raine, charged with attempting to steal an auto, out on \$1,000 bail for a week, but Police Court Clerk John Moule, apparently unwittingly, doubled the bail.

After the court had decided on the bail, the two bondsmen for Raine stepped forward to the clerk. In taking bail, the clerk mentioned \$2,000 instead of \$1,000, and the bondsmen gave their consent without dispute. And so the bail stands at \$2,000.

MAGISTRATE WITHDRAWS CASE AGAINST LABATT'S

Says Shippers Were Not Given Sufficient Notice When Prosecution Started.

On request of Albert M. Judd, counsel for the prosecution, the case against the Labatt Brewing Company, charged with transporting liquor illegally on a public highway, was withdrawn in police court Friday morning. Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett was scheduled to give a decision in the case Friday, having heard the evidence two weeks ago, but the action of the crown made this unnecessary.

"I will make no order as to costs," the court told Mr. Judd.

In explaining the matter to the deputy, counsel for the prosecution stated: "I have instructions to withdraw any further prosecution. I understand regulations were not issued and shippers were not given sufficient notice when the prosecution started."

The secretary states that although he is supposed to receive proper medical certificates from all applicants, this rule seemingly has not been enforced, as he has never received any that he can recollect.
