GUARDIAN STATES
CHILD, 8, SPIRITED
AWAY BY WOMAN

Protestant Grandfather Claims
She Was Brought to
Regina Convent.

SUES GRANDMOTHER

Writ of Habeas Corpus Issued
Against the Child's
Guardian.

Regina, Sask., June 6.—Alleging that 8-year-old Emma Rolls Waldron was spirited away from 50 Armadale avenue, the home of an aunt in Toronto, to be taken to Regina and placed in a convent to be brought up a Roman Catholic, Charles Bergman, Toronto, the Protestant grandfather of the child, has taken habeas corpus proceedings against Mrs. Waldron, maternal grandmother, who now has custody of the child. Mrs. Waldron refused to deliver the child, and has appealed the habeas corpus order. The little girl is being watched constantly to guard against the Toronto claimants. She is driven to and from the Sacred Heart Academy, and has not been allowed to go out alone since habeas corpus proceedings were taken. Appeal against the habeas corpus writ was argued yesterday before three judges of the Saskatchewan court of appeal, and it was suggested that such a course as kidnapping might be taken in order that the Protestant grandparent might secure the little girl. Then it would rest with Mrs. Waldron to secure a court order for the restoration of the child to her.

Married Years Ago.
Ten years ago, Vincent Waldron, a Roman Catholic, residing in Toronto, married Viola Bergman, Toronto, a member of the Protestant Episcopal Church. In 1917 he died. The child, at that time, was two years old, and had not started to school. According to the claim of the plaintiffs, the child was brought up as a Protestant and was placed in a Toronto public school. In 1920, Mrs. Viola Waldron, mother of Emma, died. Mr. D. F. Tremblay, a Roman Catholic, two years later she died. Shortly after the death of his wife, Mr. Tremblay took his step-child from her home with an aunt in Toronto and sent her to the home of his mother, in Vermont, U. S. A. While there, Mr. Tremblay made arrangements with her grandmother, Mrs. Waldron of Regina, to take the child and rear it.

Miss Waldron, daughter of Mrs. Waldron, went to Regina, arriving here on January 13, 1922. Meanwhile, Charles Bergman, the mother's father, had made application to the court of York County, Ontario, to be appointed guardian of the child.

Issues Writ.
On January 22, nine days after the arrival of Emma in Regina, the surrogate court of York County issued an order making Charles Bergman guardian of Emma. It is said that he demanded the child and was refused delivery. Mr. Bergman took habeas corpus proceedings before Mr. Justice Bigelow, of the Saskatchewan court of King's Bench. Justice Bigelow issued a writ of habeas corpus, requiring Mrs. Waldron to produce and deliver the child to her guardian. At the time, counsel for Mrs. Waldron made application for stay of proceedings, pending appeal of the case.

Justice Bigelow refused the application, but the writ of appeal last week granted it, thus preventing the Toronto claimants from securing the girl until the court of appeal makes disposition of the case. The appeal was argued yesterday. Decision was reserved.

REMODEL C. N. R. YARD
EAST OF EGERTON ST.

Track Gang Starts Work To
Eliminate Bad Curve and
Reduce Switches.

The Canadian National track gang has commenced work on the remodeling of the race track between the east of Egerton street. The work is expected to take at least eight weeks and include many improvements. The main object in remodeling the yard is to eliminate a bad curve in the main line tracks and to reduce the number of switches leading into the sidings from the main line. When the work is completed the leads to the sidings will switch off from a shunting spur connecting the sidings instead of from the main line. In addition to these improvements in the present track, it is intended to add two, and possibly three, new sidings to take care of the increasing freight traffic congestion which is felt here in a shortage of suitable sidings.

Ten extra hands have been added to the gang working at Egerton street.

ENGLISH FARMERETTES

GIRL THIEF SLAYS
CHICAGO CITIZEN,
ESCAPES IN AUTO

Eugene Schlig Arrested on
Suspicion in Connection
With Slaying.

WOMAN UNKNOWN

Committed Crime When Vic-
tim of Hold-Up Started
To Move.

Chicago, June 6.—Eugene Schlig, 31, was arrested on suspicion early today, in connection with the slaying of Richard C. Tesmer, wealthy insurance man, at his home here last night. The suspect is said by the police to answer to the identity of the man and woman who held up Tesmer and made off with his automobile after the girl had shot Tesmer down in the presence of his wife. After firing the shot, the girl snapped commands to her companion, leaped into Tesmer's automobile and drove away as calmly as if she were her favorite beau. Two hours later the abandoned machine was found near the scene. The slaying, characterized as without parallel in wantonness, was the first committed by a woman bandit in Chicago.

Returns From Visit.
Tesmer was returning home with his wife after a short visit to his sister. Just when he started to back his automobile into the garage, the girl and man stepped out from the shadows and commanded the couple at the point of pistols to put their hands up and get out of the car. Her companion stood silently by as the girl searched both captives.

The pursues Mr. and Mrs. Tesmer yielding only a small amount of money, the girl demanded jewelry, but scorned the watch which Tesmer promptly handed over.

Girl Fires Shot.
As the male bandit struggled with Mrs. Tesmer in an attempt to force her wedding ring from her finger, Tesmer moved, and without a word the girl bandit swung her pistol around and fired one shot. He fell, dying instantly.

Mrs. Tesmer hysterically fell over her husband's body as the bandit pair sped away in the automobile.

About ten dollars was obtained by the robbers.

BUCHANAN CRITICIZES
ALDERMEN'S LETHARGY

Will Have To Forego Elec-
trical Extension Work If
No Debentures Issued.

"If the city council puts off the question of passing the debentures much longer we shall have to stop all our extension work in electrical lines," said E. V. Buchanan this morning. "Last night, for instance, there were not enough members in attendance to ratify the debenture agreement, which requires a three-fourths vote of the council."

Mr. Buchanan explained the situation in this way: "The next meeting of the council may be in two weeks, or they may call a special meeting. But in any case it will take the best part of a month to get the sanction of the railway board, which must come afterwards. While it will not hamper our regular maintenance work, it will certainly curtail the electrical extension work, which is vital to the city, and which is becoming day by day more necessary and important."

In this connection it will be remembered that the public utilities commission has for some time now been urging on the city the need of greater electrical extension facilities, in view of the rapid increase in the use of hydro-electric in London.

It was never expected originally that this increase would come so soon and there is said to be considerable danger in any delay.

WORK ON THE NEW SPRINGBANK ROAD.
Here The Advertiser staff photographer shows the south side of the new Springbank road, which according to Boss & Brazier, the contractors, will be finished as far as the park gates this evening. The north side, which will be started immediately, will be completed by the end of the month. The photo shows very clearly the famous "Robert Greene" saw-edge finish, invented by the London businessmen after whom it is named. The saw-edge holds the gravel in place more firmly and more compactly than the flat edge, and also makes it safer and easier for the motorist to get his car back to the centre of the road when it has slipped to the side. Motorists are going to the park gates this evening. The road will follow the river road, or by following Brick street out to the reservoir.

Pavement To Springbank
Will Be Finished Tonight

South Side of Concrete To Park Gates Soon To Be Open To Traffic.

The south side of the Springbank road will be finished tonight, according to Boss & Brazier, the contractors who are doing the work. Tonight the concrete pavement will be laid as far as the park gates. The north side of the road will be started at once, beginning at the city limits and proceeding out to the park. The road is divided in the usual way for the larger highways—there are two concrete strips each side of the road, 9 feet 10 inches wide, and in the centre is a 7-foot strip of gravel. As in the case of Alexandra street, the saw-edged type of side finish, invented by Robert Greene is being used. The benefits of the saw edge, which is universally recognized by every car owner who has driven over them make it the most reliable and safest form of road siding known to the contractors at present. The saw edge holds the gravel in the centre of the road and at the sides much better and firmer than the old-fashioned straight edge, and another feature that is a help to the motorist, because when his car runs off the concrete strip it is much easier to get back again with the saw edge than where the side of the road is perfectly straight. The road, when completed, will be the finest running out of the city, and will make the evening run to London's park easier for Londoners and more attractive to strangers. The park is worthy of the new road, and the city and engineers are to be congratulated on the construction of the "Springbank Summer Trail."

METHODISTS ATTACK
QUEBEC'S LIQUOR LAW

Conference in Resolution at
Montreal Condemns Desec-
ration of Sabbath.

Brooklyn, June 6.—The Quebec liquor law, dance halls, questionable literature, Sabbath desecration and enthroning of personal entertainment, an alleged tendency of outside organizations to time meetings without having regard to weekly church services and the decline of family worship, were among the things condemned by resolution at the Montreal Methodist Conference yesterday afternoon.

The conference recommendation referred to the sale of drugs and venereal diseases and urged the unification of temperance bodies. Liquor and its various phases formed the principal subject of the afternoon. The Ontario temperance act was upheld, the Ontario Moderation League attacked, and the temperance situation in Quebec Province declared very unsatisfactory. Bootlegging, increased sale of liquor, its shipment by the commission, and the too easy granting of liquor selling permits, were specified.

FLIVVER PAYS OWN WAY
CATCHING SPEED FIENDS

BANKERS MAY FINANCE
TURKISH TERRITORIES

PAPYRUS WINNER
OF ENGLISH DERBY;
FAVORITE LOSES

Steve Donoghue, Veteran Jockey,
Wins Third Successive
Race.

LEADS BY LENGTH

King and Queen Unable To
Attend, Prince of Wales
Present.

Epsom Downs, England, June 6.—Papyrus won the 140th Derby today from a field of nineteen starters.

Pharos was second, and Parth third. Papyrus is owned by B. Irish; Pharos by Lord Derby, and Parth by M. Gouillard.

In spite of the threatening weather there was a tremendous crowd on hand to witness the classic. The only American-owned entry was Foxhall Kennel's Top Boot.

Town Guard, which was the favorite before the race, was ridden by Jockey Archibald, American. The King and Queen, who customarily attend the Derby, were absent because of the illness of Princess Christian. The Prince of Wales, however, was on hand.

Women Enter Two.
Two of the horses entered were owned by women. They were Lady Nunberg Holmes Portunna and Mrs. Bendis Skias.

The betting fluctuated hourly up to the start of the race. During the night heavy support for Papyrus was put forward. Pharos put Town Guard in the third position as favorite, but later he recovered, and shortly before starting time he was quoted at 11 to 2, while Papyrus was next at 6 to 7, and Parth at 13 to 2. Parth being far down in the list at 30 to 1 to win.

Most of the tipsters avoided advising bets on Town Guard, despite his hot favoritism, due to sensational rumors that he had gone lame. The odds were: Papyrus, 100 to 15; Pharos, 4 to 1; Parth, 33 to 1. Time two minutes four seconds.

Papyrus won by a length, while half a length separated Pharos and Parth at the finish. The race was worth more than \$25,000 to the winner.

Donoghue rode the winner. This is the third time in succession that Donoghue, a veteran jockey, has won the blue ribbon of the English turf, thus becoming entitled to wear the golden spurs. Donoghue captured the prize with Humorist in 1921, and with Captain Cuttle last year.

CONFLICTING EVIDENCE
HEARD IN SEDITION CASE

"Somebody Lied," Says Magistrate, and Proceeds To Discover Who It Is.

Sydney, N. S., June 6.—Magistrate A. B. McGilivray intimated yesterday that he would probably get ready today to hand down a decision in the case of Malcolm Bruce, Toronto, charged with seditious utterance at a meeting at Glace Bay May 6. Taking evidence in the preliminary hearing was continued yesterday. Bruce was alleged to have said he hoped to see the day when the Union Jack would be dragged in the mud. Sergeant A. D. Rolfe, of the provincial police, testified that a number of persons had spoken to him and credited Bruce with making the statements alleged. These, however, had denied under oath that they had done so.

Col. Gordon Harrington, for the defense, objected to Rolfe's testimony on the ground that conversations between present, were not admissible. Magistrate McGilivray: "It is evident somebody is lying, and we might as well go ahead and find out who it is."

BECK ACCEPTS CALL
OF PARTY IN LONDON

Says He Will Be a Candidate
"in the Interests of
Hydro."

Sir Adam Beck late last night announced his intention to stand as a Conservative candidate, saying he did so for two reasons, to use all his effort to the successful settlement of the future of the hydro electric power system in Ontario, and of the revision of the waterways treaty with the United States to permit the greater diversion of the waters of the Niagara and the proper utilization of the water power of the St. Lawrence River.

BEAT WAY TO LONDON
IN SEARCH OF WORK

Alleged Vagrants Remanded
—Drug Addicts Get Six
Months.

Arriving from Toronto yesterday morning with but 21 cents between them, Harry Mason and Ernest Preston were arrested by P. C. Ritchie in an East London poolroom and charged with vagrancy.

The two boys, 18 years of age, told the court this morning that they had beaten their way here on a freight train to find work. They had been working until about a week ago in Toronto, when they were laid off. They also stated they had been the support of their mothers while in Toronto. They were remanded for a week, in which time steps will be taken to send them back to Toronto. William Ferguson and George Morris, charged with vagrancy and drug addiction, were sentenced to six months in the reformatory. As sentence was passed, they interrupted and asked that they be given another chance. When this was refused they were escorted down stairs. Bruce Boyd, who was arrested at the same time, was allowed to go with his mother.

Mrs. Annie Bingham, charged with not sending her boy to school, was told that he must attend regularly. She informed Magistrate Graydon that her son had now been going for two weeks. The court adjourned the case for two weeks to see whether the boy was making good.

Claiming he did not know whether he was 18 years of age or not, a boy appeared in court this morning and was remanded by Magistrate Graydon, when A. Hassan was fined \$10 and costs for selling him cigarettes.

Hassan admitted selling the lad the "smokes," but claimed he had said he was 18. To the court, the boy said he thought he was 18, but was not sure. His mother stated that he would not be that old until New Year's Day. The magistrate expressed his opinion of a boy who would, by lying, get another person into trouble, and told his mother to keep a watchful eye on him in the future.

LABOR MEMBER URGES
BANKERS TO ORGANIZE

Ottawa, June 6.—Notice of motion to amend the bank bill so as to give employees of banks legal right to organize for all lawful purposes, was given at the opening of the sitting of the banking and commerce committee this morning.

J. D. Woodsworth, Labor member for Centre Winnipeg, was responsible for the motion. He explained that the right to organize was recognized under the treaty of Versailles. Complaints had been made that organization of clerks were discouraged by bank managers in Canada.

LIGHTNING BOLT
NEARLY CAUSES
WOMAN'S DEATH

Mrs. George Williams of To-
ronto Suffers Severe
Shock.

STRATFORD VISITED

Three Homes Damaged Follow-
ing Heavy Electrical
Storms in District.

Toronto, June 6.—When her home at 84 Benson avenue was struck by lightning during the height of last night's thunderstorm Mrs. George Williams, narrowly escaped death and suffered shock. She experienced a numbing sensation down the entire side of her head and body.

Today Mrs. Williams is much improved, but under medical care and suffering from nervous shock. The chimney of the house was entirely demolished and the interior walls cracked.

THREE HOMES BURNED.

Stratford, June 6.—Three homes were struck by lightning during the severe storm which passed over here late yesterday afternoon. Two houses on opposite sides of the street are reported to have been struck by same bolt. The chimney of one house was completely shattered. The lightning followed the chimney down into the cellar where it blew open the furnace door and filled the basement with soot.

At the other house the lightning entered by the same route, the chimney, and lifted all the lids on the coal stove in the kitchen, a bright blue flame lighted the kitchen and parlor with weird effect. The third house in another part of the city suffered little damage.

The rain has done both good and harm to the crops. It has helped the spring stuff along but has delayed the planting of corn.

WOULD HAVE DUNNING
HEAD OF WHEAT BOARD

Sales Declares Premier of Sas-
katchewan Logical Man
For \$50,000 Job.

Ottawa, June 6.—"There is a great opportunity awaiting a great man," said Thomas Sales of Saltcoats, commenting upon the efforts of the western government to secure a head for the wheat board, provided for by federal and provincial legislation.

"Premier Dunning of Saskatchewan," said Mr. Sales, "is credited with the statement that numbers of men of various professions have applied for the \$50,000 job. I want to say, reports to the contrary notwithstanding, that I am not among those who have made such application. I quite agree with Mr. Dunning when he says that unless men can be found to direct the operations of a wheat board who will command respect there should be no wheat board. But I want to say this: there is no man outside of the rank and file of the men engaged in the regular grain trade who would be better qualified to fill the position of head of the board, and in whom the people would have more confidence than in Mr. Dunning himself. In my opinion it is up to Mr. Dunning."

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
