BUDGET TAX REDUCTION GIVES \$2.70 PER CAPITA

Hon. J. E. Sinclair Declares Farmers Not in Need of More Protection.

HIT IMMIGRATION

J. D. Chaplin Again Opposes Trade Treaty Made With France.

Ottawa, April 15.—Further House debate on the budget today opened with an analysis of Canada's farm production, passed to the Oriental question and later turned to the trade treaty concluded with France more than a year ago.

Hon. J. E. Sinclair, minister without portfolio, taking up agricultural production, held that more protection was not necessary for the prosperity and success of the Canadian farmer. He calculated that the tax reductions proposed in the budget would mean a saving of \$2.70 for every man, woman and child in the country, and finally he pointed out the need of Prince Edward Island for branch lines.

A. W. Neill of Comox-Alberni, B.C., thought the government should follow the example of the United States and adopt a policy of exclusion towards the Japanese. From Conservatism came strong criticism of the French trade treaty. Last year when the treaty was before the House, J. D. Chaplin, of Lincoln County, Ont., attacked it. Tonight he sharply returned the charge. He estimated that as a result of the treaty there would be a loss of revenue on imports from France, Switzerland, Japan and Norway of \$1,584,000 in the twelve months.

Ottawa, April 15.—Hon. John E. Sinclair compared expenditures of the government today with those of the previous government during the last year of administration. In the fiscal year 1913-14 expenditures had been \$785,869,000, and in 1922-23 \$828,283,199. In 1921-22, the first full fiscal year over which this government had control, expenditures had dropped to \$463,652,436, and in 1922-23 they decreased to \$375,213,651. On the other hand, revenue was showing a decided increase.

Mr. Sinclair insisted that the present government had found it necessary to provide not only for interest and running expenses, but also for the capital cost of the war and demobilization.

Mr. Sinclair congratulated the management of the Canadian National Railways on the increased revenue shown by the operation of that line. The public works expenditures during the war were reduced to a minimum, and during the first two years of the present government he found it impossible to effect economy. This year, however, estimates for public works had been reduced.

The present budget showed a greater reduction of national debt than had ever been announced to the people of Canada. It was a greater reduction than the aggregate reduction shown during the Laurier regime or during the period of office of the Conservative party between 1911 and 1921.

Export Vegetables.

Mr. Sinclair reviewed the import figures of Canada for the nine months ending December, 1923. During that time Canada imported vegetables and vegetable products of a kind produced in Canada to the value of \$22,979,925, and of a kind not produced in Canada to the value of \$74,910,419. Over the same period the export of vegetables and vegetable products were valued at \$21,893,000.

Mr. Sinclair analyzed imports of agricultural products at length to show that Canada's imports were almost entirely seasonal in character and came in in spite of duties varying from twenty to thirty per cent. If higher duties were imposed, he argued, they would not benefit the Canadian producer because at the time of import there were no fresh fruits available in Canada. The result of higher duties would merely be to place a heavier burden on the laborers and artisans of the country and thus increase the difficulties of manufacturing in Canada.

J. D. Chaplin (Conservative, Lincoln) asked if Mr. Sinclair said that artisans and laborers purchased these early fruits.

"Certainly," replied another Liberal member.

"Will my honorable friend tell me," was Mr. Sinclair's reply, "where they can get them if they don't purchase them?"

Cheese Is Different.

Mr. Sinclair challenged the statements of Sir Henry Drayton that Canada imported large quantities of cheese. Such imports of cheese as there were, he claimed, were of a kind not produced in Canada.

Donald Sutherland (Conservative, South Oxford) called attention to the large imports of butter, and Mr. Sinclair retorted by asking Mr. Sutherland if he proposed to put higher taxation on the butter used by the Canadian housewife.

"Our exports exceed our imports," replied Mr. Sutherland, "so that we have a surplus."

Mr. Sinclair asserted that the imports of butter, like the imports of fruits, were seasonal and came in at a time when there was not enough butter produced in Canada to meet the Canadian demand.

In 1923 Canada imported 8,319,522 dozen eggs, mostly from the United States, into Ontario and Quebec during the months of low production in Canada. To increase the duty of 3c a dozen would be to raise the cost to the consumer. The Canadian producer was able to supply the Canadian demand except during the winter months of low production.

Donald Sutherland asked how production could be encouraged while foreign eggs were allowed to enter Canadian markets.

Reduce Production Cost.

Mr. Sinclair replied that by adopting expert methods our production could be increased and the cost of production reduced.

A. W. Neill (Independent, Comox-Alberni) asked why the paper-making industry had been overlooked by the government when reducing the tariff on implements of production.

Touching on the Oriental question,

former manager of the bond department of the Home Bank, Toronto, who testified yesterday before the public accounts committee at Toronto.

Mr. Neill regretted that the restrictions made last year in respect to Chinese could not have been extended to Japanese. He was sick of hearing about the "grave international complications" which Japan was wont to threaten when restriction was mooted. Canada had not gone to Washington rattling a sword and making threats when the United States tariff law was imposed. Great Britain, with a surplus population to dispose of, had accepted the United States immigration quota. Why should Japan not recognize Canada's right to restrict the influx of people whose living standard was lower than Canadians, just as Japan restricted the immigration of Chinese and Koreans because their standard of living was lower?

J. S. Woodsworth (Labor, Center Winnipeg) asked if Mr. Neill would favor embargo on imports of goods from such countries as had a lower living standard than Canada.

No Injury to Trade.

Mr. Neill said he did not intend to be drawn into a discussion of the tariff while he was talking about immigration. He was not in favor of imposing heavy tariffs at the present time. There was no danger that

Japan would cease to trade with Canada if immigration was restricted. People always bought in the nearest and best market.

Mr. Neill quoted from a pamphlet issued by the Japanese consul-general in 1922, which stated that 1,115 Japanese domestic servants had entered Canada between 1908 and 1921. The Canadian census returns covering the same period show that 110 Japanese domestic servants had entered the country. It proved how impossible it was to tell how many were entering the country when the figures of the governments differed.

SENTENCE IS GIVEN FORMER LONDONER

George Griffin Will Serve Six Months in San Diego Jail.

San Diego, Calif., April 15.—George W. Griffin, formerly of London, Ontario, was sentenced in San Diego Federal Court today to serve six months in the San Diego County jail, following a plea of guilty to violation of the United States immigration laws. Griffin was charged with bringing a woman to United States from Canada for immoral purposes.

Mrs. J. S. Stewart, widow, London, Ontario, whom Griffin admitted in a statement to the court that he brought to this country, and who was apprehended with him, has been held in the detention home, and according to immigration officials will be deported to Canada soon.

"You have forgotten all prehistoric man instincts, that's all," said the judge in sentencing Griffin. "You have offered an excuse for your conduct a statement of intention to marry this woman. You know and I know that such an excuse is foolish. This court has investigated your course of conduct and your relations with this woman. You appear to have done some service for the immigration department. I am informed. You know what it is. This and this only prevents this court from sentencing you to Federal penitentiary. Your sentence is extremely light under the circumstances."

NEW REPARATIONS PLAN ACCEPTED BY BERLIN GOVT.

Commission Receives Formal Notification of Acceptance From Berlin Government.

MISGIVINGS PREVAIL

Berlin, April 15.—Formal notification of Germany's acceptance of the experts' reports as a basis for renewed reparation parleys was sent to Paris this afternoon and will be transmitted to the reparation committee by Secretary Fischer of the German foreign office.

The German action represents the concurring opinion of the Marx-Stresemann cabinet, the premiers of the federated German states, and Reichstag party leaders, which lift the conferences which have been going on for the past few days developed diverging opinions with respect to some of the essential features of the reports, there was unanimity on the final issue that Germany must forthwith indicate her readiness to accept the reports in their entirety so as to afford a comprehensive groundwork for renewed deliberations.

"Grave doubts were expressed by the provincial premiers," said a leading official of the foreign office at the conclusion of today's conference between Chancellor Marx and the party leaders, "with respect to Germany's future ability to meet even some of the elementary conditions laid down by the Dawes committee, and while all the participants in the conference praised the objectiveness of the reports, their business-like tenor and feeling in manner in which they lift the whole reparation tangle from the atmosphere of political acerbities, there nevertheless was a pronounced feeling of depression over the burdens that eventually will be imposed on Germany."

That the reports reflected the mature conclusions of businessmen and experts wholly free from dogmatic principles with respect to a solution of the reparation problem, made a strong appeal to the heads of the federated states, who appeared to be of the opinion that the experts had injected the necessary amount of elasticity into their recommendations, whereby the subjects of payments and other conditions to be agreed

upon would be made to conform to the measure of Germany's economic rehabilitation.

"Throughout our discussions," the foreign official declared, "there was never for a moment the thought of anything but unconditional acceptance of the invitation from the reparation commission to accept the experts' report as a basis for arriving at a final solution of the reparation tangle, if only for the reason that Germany, for more than a year, has been courting an expert investigation of her economic capacity, although the investigation conducted by the experts appointed by the former belligerent nations hardly conformed to the suggestion of Secretary Hughes, or the proposal advanced by Chancellor Cuno."

U. F. O. TO REMAIN INTACT AS GROUP

Pass Resolution Expressing Confidence in Leader, Hon. Manning Doherty.

Toronto, April 15.—The members of the United Farmers' party in the Ontario Legislature this afternoon at a meeting at the Parliament buildings, passed a resolution expressing confidence in their leader, Hon. Manning Doherty.

The group also went on record as being unanimously of the opinion that they should remain intact as a group in the Legislature.

The absence of the prime minister created some comment when Viscount Curzon presented a motion that "the House, viewing with anxiety recent events in India, regrets the lack of a clear statement of policy on this subject by his majesty's government."

RISE OF FRENCH FRANC REACTS ON JAP MONEY

Franc Reaches New High Level—Foreign Exchange Upset.

New York, April 15.—Political developments today were responsible for conflicting movements in the foreign exchange market, carrying French francs up to a new high record for the year above 64c, and forcing a reaction in Japanese yen to a 1924 low at 41.10 cents.

Germany's ready acceptance of the exports' report, combined with Great Britain's approval, resulted in fresh buying of both sterling and French francs and a stiffening of the nominal quotation for German marks. Sterling, selling above \$4.35 was within a cent of the year's peak price.

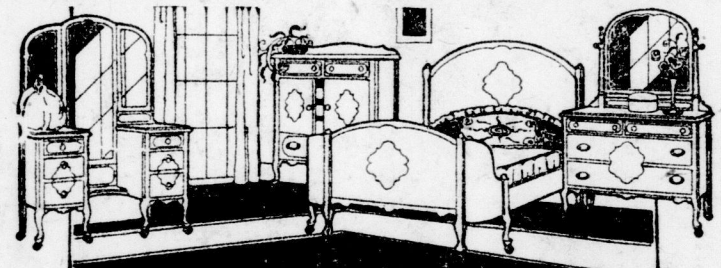

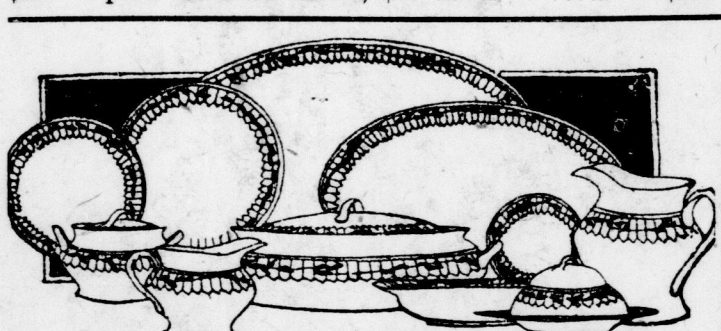

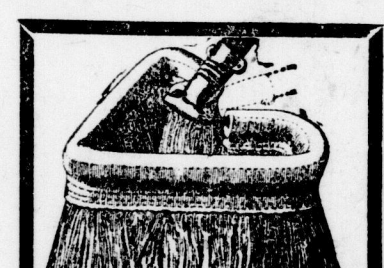
