

YOUNGER PUPILS TO BE EXAMINED

Even Kindergarten Children
Must Get Health
Certificates.

Pupils who entered the public school kindergarten classes last February are to be included, according to Administrator G. A. Wheable, B.A., in the medical examination work undertaken by the board of education for the first time this year.

This step, in connection with which examinations are now in progress throughout the city, has been taken by the board in view of the fact that the \$1,500 provided for the estimates will not cover the cost of the examinations made of the pupils entering kindergarten last month.

The board sent out 650 cards at the beginning of the school year to parents of boys and girls entering school for the first time, and to date about 618 of these have been returned, bearing information as to the medical examination performed by the family physician at the cost of \$1. paid by the board.

Finding that the board's estimate was going to complete a winter examination than was planned at first, Mr. Wheable recommended to the board that the February kindergarten pupils, about 400 in number, be examined as well, and thus complete the examination for all the pupils in the first year of the public schools.

I thought there was going to be a fight for a little while, but Little and Witte, I'd vote ten times if any person could get me out today. 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Spain Will Buy Columbus' Letters

Steps Taken To Secure Documents From the Duke of Veragua.

Madrid, Oct. 29.—The Spanish government has taken steps to acquire important archives of the voyages of Columbus, now the property of the Duke of Veragua, and yesterday an expedition of the police kept in the bank of Spain was made by the mayor of Seville and Gen. Hermosa, of the military directorate, on behalf of the government.

These archives comprise 67 documents and to be of great value, including a letter from his Catholic majesties Ferdinand and Isabella, authorizing one of Columbus' voyages, and letters from Columbus to the Spanish sovereigns and to the king of Portugal.

The mayor of Seville said after the inspection that the state would acquire the documents for 1,500,000 pesetas (about \$15,000), although American collectors had offered twice as much. He said the collection would be housed at Seville.

NO SCHOOLS USED AS VOTING STATIONS

Government Believes in Paying Individuals Rather Than Municipalities.

No city schools are being used as polling stations today, but that does not mean that the city council has got around the ruling made by the board of education in demanding advance payment for the use of the schools for that purpose. In fact, the returning officer secures all polling stations at the expense of the federal treasury, independent of the city council, and since the government believes in paying private individuals, rather than the municipality, the local schools have never been used, according to information given by Administrator G. A. Wheable, B.A., for federal or provincial election purposes.



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FRANCE IS SATISFIED WITH NEW CABINET

Premier Painleve Takes Post of Minister of Finance Under New Scheme.

Paris, Oct. 29.—At an early hour this morning Premier Painleve succeeded in completing a cabinet which is satisfactory to everybody, and to President Doumergue. In it M. Painleve takes over the portfolio of minister of finance. Aristide Briand retains the post of foreign minister. The other portfolios were distributed as follows: Justice, M. Chauvignat; Interior, M. Schrameck; Agriculture, M. Demonceau; Commerce, M. Chautemps; Education, M. Chautemps; Culture, Jean Durand; Instruction, M. Delphos; pensions, Paul Morel; labor, M. Durafour; colonies, M. Antonicin. The under-secretaries are understood not to have been changed. The new combination tends slightly more to the left than the former cabinet.

PROOF LINE PAVEMENT NOW EXTENDS SEVEN MILES

The Proof Line road, closed for paving operations as far as St. Johns for the past three months, is now open to traffic, says operators from the north stated today. Grading operations at the sides of the pavement have not been quite completed, but this is no hindrance to traffic, they state. Motorists can now travel on pavement on the Proof Line road from London to the 8th concession of London township, a distance of seven miles. They will still experience a detour, however, this side of Bar where the road is closed owing to repairs being made on the second bridge south of that village.
