THE CITY'S HEALTH.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDI-C .L HEALTH OFFICER.

Dr. Hutchinson Deals in an Interesti g Way With Matters in Als Department-Mortality from Consumption Equal to That of Five or Six Other Diseases-The City's Low Death Rate-Abattoir Wanted-The Milk Supply-Rabies.

The final meeting of the Board Health for 1897 was held last night, when Dr. Hutchinson presented his report on the health of the city for the year ending Nov. 15. As usual, the report was of a satisfactory character, and it caused Mr. John Christie to remark that London was the healthiest city in Canada.

"Yes." said Dr. Hutchinson, "it is the healthiest on the continent of places having over 20,000 inhabitants. The death rate, however, was one point higher than last year, being 12.1. Dr. Campbell said London could safely be considered the healthlest city on the continent.

year was 456. Two hundred and sixteen cases of infectious diseases were reported, of which 3 proved fatal. 
