

Washington, March 4.—To-day, for the fourth time in the history of this republic, a native born citizen of Ohio in the presence of thousands of his countrymen, took the solemn oath which bound him for four years to watch over and guard the welfare of the American people. It was an impressive but beautifully simple ceremony that marked the accession of William McKinley, of Ohio, to the high office of president of the United States of America. There was no flash of gratified triumph in the dark eye beneath the broad white brow that scanned the shouting, cheering multitude that confronted him on the broad terrace of the east front of the capitol, but an expression of humility, mingled with the realization of the heavy burdens he was about to assume, and of manly determination faithfully to discharge the manifold duties of his high office, as he bent his head and repeated in a clear voice the words "I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."
