PROVED INNOCENT AFTER SERVING YEAR

George G. Ellis Honorably
Discharged From Accusation
of Theft of \$1200.

HAD HARD TIME

George J. Ellis of Point St. Charles, who was charged with having stolen a cash box containing \$1,200.00 from the office of the Atlantic Quebec and Western Railway, by whom he was employed, at New Carlisle, at Quebec, Quebec, and who was arrested January 24th, 1908, was last week honorably discharged by Judge Choquet.

Ellis had a hard time of it since he was charged with the theft. He was incarcerated for over eleven months. It was only last June that the application for change of venue was granted on application of Mr. J. C. Walsh, K. C.

The real perpetrator of the robbery is still at large. The empty cash box was found in a shed behind a hotel at New Carlisle, and Ellis was immediately suspected, arrested and placed in jail. Eleven months afterwards the jury trial took place, but a new trial was ordered. It was then that application was made for a change of venue to Montreal.

NEWCASTLE, Sept. 23—Scarcely a day had passed since the ferryboat carrying the family of John Russell & Company, the only child of T. Galley died yesterday of cholera infantum, aged four months.
