## Premier Veniot at Dalhousie

that his time was all taken up. The Premier remarked that his time was also taken up, but he could make an opportunity to meet Mr. Baxter.

Mr. Baxter says he would like more information. "I have been keeping a record of Mr. Baxter's statements in connection with the Grand Falls proposition since he has become leader of the Opposition," said the Premier.

"and I find that he now has to his credit five different shifts. He wants on four months to get full information. Why it has taken the government eighteen months to procure the information they have. But Mr. Baxter had his eyes opened Saturday when he saw that the contract for the Grand Falls development had been let for \$1,546,556 or \$486,444 less than the engineers' estimates.

This was the positive price, made under contract signed and sealed. Added to this the cost of machinery for the power house, which is known to a dollar, and the cost of transmission lines, and we can say exactly what the entire development will cost.

On two items alone, we have already shown a saving below the estimates of about \$800,000, and he could say definitely that power would be sold at Campbellton and Bathurst at less than \$27.00 per H. P. There is now no guess work about it. The Premier then entered into a discussion of the signing of the contract with the International Pulp and Paper Company. He refuted the allegations that the contract had been signed in his own room by himself "in the nick of the night."

Hon. Mr. Baxter had been referred to his own law partner regarding the signing of the contract, which was witnessed by Mr. Lewin, Consulting Engineer, Hon. I. C. Rand and two members of the Commission and myself. Since the leader of the Opposition has opened the door to insinuations regarding the character of the members of the Government that door will be kept open, Mr. Veniot declared, but it will be kept open by assertions of the Opposition. The latter have said that "the night was dark" when the contract was signed, but it was not so dark as had been hoped for when the \$125,000 had been taken by J. Kidd Fleming, or when \$100,000 had been taken on the patriotic potato deal. It was not so dark as Mr. Baxter would have hoped for but did not get, the night George B. Jones placed \$20,000 in Mr. Baxter's own safe or when Mr. Baxter had paid out \$3,000 to cover up the potato scandal or when he had taken a cheque for \$500 from

E. R. Gould and Company and had returned it later when it was discovered.

Mr. Baxter had helped, as Attorney General, to cook the accounts of the province and he had said that he would rather hold his tongue and go down to defeat with the rest of them than disclose what he knew. He is the man, the Premier declared, who is seeking to get back into power again.

Mr. Baxter had said that he wanted an honest Government and yet he appeared on a platform in Woodstock with J. Kidd Fleming on one side of him and B. Frank Smith, the perpetrator of the potato scandal on the other. Mr. Baxter had said that he wanted to cover up a scandal and who paid out only \$30,000 for that purpose, putting the rest of it into the hands of the boodle gang, was also there.

That is the group, the Premier declared, which is seeking to gain control of the affairs of the province, while it so far has been unable to make a single charge against the present administration.

The Premier then referred to Hon. Mr. Baxter's loss of temper at Bathurst when he had been presented with a questionnaire concerning the scandal with which he had been connected. There Hon. Mr. Baxter had referred to the Premier of the Province as a small spotted animal which left a stench behind. He had too great respect for a skunk to liken Mr. Baxter to one and as far as a stench was concerned the stench of a skunk had nothing on that of Patriotic Potatoes. If Mr. Baxter did not have any respect for the holder of the office then he should for the office itself, the office which he was striving to obtain.

When the Foster Government came into power in 1917 he had been placed at the head of the biggest spending department, Public Works. In the past eight years that department had spent nearly \$14,000,000 and not a charge of a mis-spent dollar could be brought against it. It was something for which the Government was to be congratulated and he contrasted this record with the conditions prior to 1917, when hundreds of thousands of dollars had been misappropriated. "The Liberals of the province of New Brunswick and the other supporters of the Government can go through the country with their heads held high. Do not be ashamed to support the administration because there has not been one shadow of scandal cast upon it," he declared.

Compensation Act  
"I believe the Workmen's Compens-

sation Act is the best act any government has ever placed upon the statute books of the province," declared Premier Veniot. "Never before did the laboring man have any protection or the mother or orphan in the event of death of the husband and father.

"Why should the lumber industry not pay?" asked the Premier. "It is the industry making money out of the laboring man? So long as I am head of this Government the Act will stand despite the threats of the lumbermen. Let them come. I am prepared to meet them."

Who opposed the present Compensation Act when it was up in the house. Every member of the opposition, including Messrs. Stewart and Dittie opposed it. He warned the laboring men to be on their guard.

Under the Compensation Act, a penalty is provided where the employer regulates the wage paid on the basis of the compensation fees he has to pay. The lumbermen always denied this was being done. We now have their own admission of the existence of a scheme to make the workmen pay for his own protection. I intend to have this matter fully gone into by the law officers of the Crown and will see that the proper remedy be applied without mercy, fear or favor. It is an outrage, a robbery of the rights of the working man. It also gives the lie direct to those lumbermen who are asking for a reduced wage and refuse to give a corresponding increase of wages to the men, because compensation is costing too much. How can it cost too much to the lumbermen if they make the workman pay it? It is another way of robbing the poor man.

### Provincial Finances

The Premier touched on the finances of the Province. The statement of the Opposition that the debt was thirty-five millions was not correct. It was \$29,960,000. When the present administration took office it found floating indebtedness which amounted to falsification of the financial statement. Their statement was not correct. This government had increased the debt but it had something to show for it. Musquash accounted for much and was paying its way. There had been a great increase in revenue. The funding of the Motor Vehicle Fees had been adopted and had proven so successful that other provinces had copied the system. The old government increased the debt fourteen million dollars in nine years and the only thing they had to show for it was the Valley Railway, which was the sink hole for thousands of dollars yearly.
