F. H. Wyatt has received the following relating to the gold situation in the United States from Robert Goodley & Co., New York:

The Treasury has about \$24,500,000 of gold, against which the reserve required by custom against the greenback issue (about \$360,000,000) is \$100,000,000 gold, it would follow that there was yesterday about \$24,000,000 of so-called free gold which will be paid out in exchange for legal tender notes. The Secretary of the Treasury is empowered and directed to sell bonds to get gold if such a thing is needed to maintain the turrency at par and he will, we suppose, consider imself bound to do so when about \$15,000,000 of he \$24,000,000 free gold is gone. Surely these conds will find a ready market, and will give lenty of time for Congress to stop silver purhases, and we believe that such a necessity will ouse the people to demand that they be opped at once.


