

OBITUARY

George Landsburg, for many years a resident of this vicinity, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. F. F. Mark, Deckerville, Mich., on Monday, Jan. 31st, 1921, at 3 p.m. Mr. Landsburg had a stroke three weeks previous to his death. He was born in Nova Scotia July 15, 1841. On Jan. 2nd, 1868, he was united in marriage to Jane Mitchell, making their home in Nova Scotia for sixteen years, then coming to Watford, Ont., where they resided for thirteen years and where Mrs. Landsburg passed away in the year 1891. Mr. Landsburg then moved to Deckerville, Mich., where he made his home until the time of his death. To this union there were born ten children. He is survived by one son Alexander of Deckerville, Mich., and three daughters, Mrs. F. F. Mark of Deckerville, Mrs. Elmer Paige of Port Huron, and Miss Maud of Detroit. He is also survived by two sisters who live in Nova Scotia. The funeral services were held from the Presbyterian church of Deckerville of which he was a member for many years, after which the remains were taken to Watford for burial. The funeral was held on Thursday, Feb. 3, to the Watford cemetery. Rev. E. H. Savers conducting the service.

BIG FARMERS' MEETING

One of the largest and most enthusiastic gatherings of farmers that ever assembled in Petrolia, gathered to attend the Annual Meeting of the Lambton County Co-operative Association on Tuesday. That the benefits to be derived by co-operation are understood by the farmers of Lambton and that the farmers intend to co-operate was plainly evident by the tone and spirit of the speeches delivered and the business transacted.

President H. A. Gilroy, of Alvington, called the meeting to order at 10 a.m. After the reading and adoption of the minutes of the last members' meeting, the Auditors' presented their report. The directors of the Association and several of the members addressed the gathering.

The present financial standing of the Association shows a small deficit. This is owing to the fact of the drop in prices of the stock carried in the Association warehouse. As the Association is financed by capital notes, twenty-five dollars a piece, nearly 800 in number, the deficit has to be covered by a small levy on each capital note. The fact of a deficit is not evident of lack of interest. Those present considered this fact a small matter. Every farmer present or member of the Association has lost many times the amount of the deficit on each head of cattle, horses, also hens, on his farm during the past year. The association as it now stands, is a county-wide organization. Many new such organizations have been organized at various local centres within the County. Inwood, Watford, Forest, Camlachie and many more are in the process of organization. Owing to this fact many of the members wished to withdraw their capital notes. A local centre being more convenient it was decided to allow these parties their capital notes, and this step will necessitate the re-organization of the association located in Petrolia. The following motion was passed to meet with the conditions.

Moved by W. A. Brock, seconded by R. J. Gardiner, that the following men, Chas. M. Fleck, W. P. Macdonald, Geo. Steinhoff, F. J. McMahon and Robt. Luke be a committee to take full charge of the management of the Lambton County Co-operative Association. They are to liquidate the association as it now stands and to levy sufficient amount on all of the capital notes to cover the liabilities and to return to the members their notes upon the receipt of the amount of the levy. They are also instructed to make plans and arrangements for the further carrying on of a co-operative farm business in the town of Petrolia.

The Enniskillen members of the organization held a meeting in the Agricultural Office at the conclusion of the former meeting. Each member expressed himself as being pleased with the co-operative movement and also expressed a desire that the new organization be capitalized locally and that a warehouse be operated and that steps also be taken to establish a grain elevator. —Advertiser-Topic.
