

POPE BENEDICT IS DEAD

Head of Roman Catholic Church Died on Sunday.

Death Was Due to Infectious Pnenmonia of a Particularly Malignant Kind and Pontia Suffered Terribly In His Dogged Struggle for Life-Dignitaries of Church Remain at Prayer In Vatican.

ROME, Jan. 23.—Arrayed in full anonicals, with golden mitre, gloves and ring, the body of Benedict XV. lies in state in the throne room, on the floor immediately below the apartment in which he died.

For many hours Sunday to the room where the Pontiff had made his fight for life came a continuous tives of foreign nations, high pre-lates and others. Then, late in the afternoon, in gorgeous procession, composed of Palatine guards, gendarmes, the Swiss guard, secret cham-berlains and honorary chamberlains, the body was solemnly transported down the royal staircase, through Clementine Hall into the throne room, where it was placed on a raised catafalque, before which the whole diplomatic corps paid devout

The Sacristian Zampani gave absolution and the cardinals sprinkled holy water, while the penitentiaries unceasingly chanted prayers, answered by the kneeling onlookers. Immediately afterwards the doors were opened to the multitudes desirous of looking for the last time sirous of looking for the last time

on the departed Pontiff.

The sacred congregation convened Sunday morning when the cardinals were informed of the Pope's death. With the exception of Cardinal Gasparri, the Papal Secretary of State, they gathered in Benedict's private apartments. Gasparri, in due and solemn form, escorted by the Swiss guards in full dress and accompanied by the prelates and acolytes of the Reverend Apartic Chamber enter-Reverend Apostolic Chamber, enter-ed the apartments a few minutes later. He will administer the Holy See during the interregnum. With him also was Monsignor Sincero, Secretary of the Sacred College.

Cardinal Gasparri, surrounded by the cardinals, then proceeded to verify the death of Benedict, extending over the lifeless form a silver wand, crying out "Giacomo."

He opened the certificate of death and declared: "Dominius Papa Noster Mortuus est," thus announcing officially the Pope's death.

Pope Benedict breathed his last at six o'clock Sunday morning. The

news was hurriedly communicated from the papal bed chamber to the principal ante-chamber and was announced by Monsignor Pizzardo, Deputy Papal Secretary of State, just as the ponderous bells of St. Peter's. overlooking the Vatican courtyard, began tolling the hour of six. Then one by one the bells in Rome's 400 churches joined in the horologic symphony that marked the passing of the head of the Roman Catholic Church.

The end came after a long night The end came after a long night of intense agony and suffering, the Pontiff now and then larsing into delirium throughout the long, anxious night. Shortly before midnight he took a little nourishment, which seemed momentarily to revive his suirits but within an hour afterhis spirits, but within an hour afterwards he began to sink rapidly. At 1.15 o'clock Dr. Battistini, emerging from the pontificial chamber into the ante-room, told the Associated Press correspondent the end was

approaching, that already his hands and nose felt cold.

From that period on the Pope neared the end of his life. Breathing became a tragic, agonizing task, as the Supreme Pontiff, who had resisted the severe lung and threat sisted the severe lung and throat congestion, was now finally too weak to overcome the overwhelming at-

to overcome the overwhelming attack any longer.

His heart rapidly weakened, and at five o'clock in the morning it was certain that the end was a matter of moments. Accordingly, Cardinals Gasparri, Samper and Pizzardo, and all the pontificial household, were notified that the end was rapidly approaching. Cardinal Gasparri entered the bed chamber at 55.50 o'clock. He had been there but nine minutes before the Pope breathed his last.

Pope Benedict XV. was born in Pegli, in the diocese of Genoa, Italy, November 21, 1854.

Giacomo Della Chiesa, as Pope Benedict XV. was christened, spent all his boyhood in the little Italian scion of a democratic aristocracy, the scion of a democratic aristocracy, the ancient Ligurian nobility, members of which are prominent in the learned professions in Italy. His father was the Marchese Guiseppe Della Chiesa and his mother the Marchesa Ciovanna Migliorati. Both are dead. His elder brother, the admiral, inherited the title.

The Pope was educated at Caphanica College, in Rome, and four years later he was ordained a priest. He at once entered the academy of noble ecclesiastics, from which the then Mgr. Rampolla took him to be his private secretary. In 1893 Rampolla was made papal nuncio at Malid, a post of the greatest importance at that time. The young priest

gave him a training in diplomacy such as probably could have been obtained from no ofher living man. When Rampolla returned to Rome as secretary of state to Leo XIII., he took Mgr. Della Chiesa with him and made him under-secretary.

When Cardinal Delia Chiesa went into the conclave, after the death of Pope Pius X., there were few who believed that his election was a possibility. But he was elected on September 3, 1914.

Valuable Apartment Houses Destroy-

ed In Montreal. MONTREAL, Jan. 23. - Caught under a falling wall following an explosion. Lieut. Paul Deloges and Fireman Louis Paul Presseau, were killed and it is feared that other victims may die under the ruins of the Vimy Apartments, which with the adjoining Harvard Apartments at 5,618 to 5,625 Sherbrooke street west, were totally destroyed by fire of undetermined origin which was discovered at seven o'clock Sunday

Four other firemen were overcome by gas and sustained cuts, but no one was seriously affected.

After the fire had been discovered in a laundry at 5,618 and the firemen were subduing it, there came a men were subduing it, there came a not very loud report which was almost immediately followed by another explosion that tore out the front of the laundry and spread the fire in all directions with amazing rapidity. It was in this explosion that the firemen were caught. Three alarms were then turned in, the first third alarm of the year.

A high westerly wind, the bitter cold which made water pumping difficult, and the rapid spread of the fire soon settled the fate of the apartments. The two apartment

apartments. The two apartment houses are valued at \$250,000 and apartments. there were nine shops on the ground floor of the buildings, whose con-tents were also destroyed. Spectacular rescues and escapes

took place during the fire. Children lightly dressed were separated from their parents and one, a boy of 11, was only found later, wandering about barefooted in the bitter cold. It is feared both his feet are frozen. A man passing in the street at the time of the explosion, Charles Chene, was struck by a piece of flying glass, and had to have six stitches put in his cheek. It is thought the Chinese, who were working in the laundry where the fire originated, were trap-ped in the back room.

VISCOUNT BRYCE DEAD.

Passed Away.

LONDON, Jan. 23. — Viscount Bryce died at Sidmouth on Sunday.

Bryce died at Sidmouth on Sunday. The end came peacefully and somewhat suddenly. Viscount Bryce had been staying in Sidmouth for the past three weeks and was extremely energetic to the last.

Viscount Bryce was sent to Washington in 1907 as Ambassador from Great Britain. His success in negotiating the fisheries treaty was a diplomatic triumph. The treaty grewout of the constant conflict between out of the constant conflict between the Canadian and American fishermen in the Cape Cod region, which caused considerable friction and annoyance to both Governments. The caused considerable rriction and an-noyance to both Governments. The treaty not only served to end these disturbances, but it also operated to enhance friendly feeling between the Canadian and United States authori-

ties.

Born in 1838 in Glasgow, the late Born in 1838 in Glasgow, the late James Bryce practiced as a barrister for some years at Lincoln's Inn. He was elected M.P. in 1880 and entered the Cabinet later. He was the author of many historical and political works, including "Modern Democracy," "The American Commonwealth," and "Studies in History and Jurisprudence."

Bedard came to Jersey City and took a room at 100 Ocean avenue. He went to work as a milk driver during the milk strike. The man was arrested in Bayonne on Dec. 28, under the name of Joseph Kelly. His identification as Bedard was brought about through a comparison of finger prints.

Hughes was accompanied to the fail by Inspetor Miller, of the Ontario Jail Department and John Conroy, an immigration agent from Ellis Island. Upon presentation of affidavits by the Canadian officials, Conroy said he would have Eedard leported to Guelph.
