

General Sessions of the Peace.

Held at Annapolis Royal, October 30th, 1877.

Court opened in the Court House, Annapolis, on Tuesday, the 30th October, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

Present—His Honor the Justice; Justices Spinney, T. C. Wheelock, Carleton, Holland, Corbett, Vroom, Elliott, Longley, Balcom, Horafall, W. B. Troop, Jones, Richardson, Harris, J. M. Harris, Potter, Parker, D. Morse, et al.

Grand Jury called: seventeen answer: Charles W. Parker, appointed foreman; Jury sworn, charged by the Justice, and retired to discharge their duty accordingly.

Upon hearing read the Petition of John Lockett and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for a new road in Dalhousie, the receipt whereon addressed to Hugh Kerr, John Piggott, and John Murdoch, and the return of said Committee, and it further appearing that the law in all respects has been complied with, it is ordered, that the said road as in said petition mentioned, be, and the same is hereby confirmed.

Upon reading and considering the Petition of W. H. Balcom and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for the extension of the Balcom road (so called) northward to the Chertow road, it is ordered, That a precept do issue and be directed to W. B. Starrist, Isaac Longley, and Robert Marshall as a Committee, directing them to enquire into the property and necessity of said road extension, as prayed for, and if necessary and proper to lay out the same in manner prescribed by Law.

Upon reading and considering the Petition of George R. McLellan and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for an alteration in the road leading from the Liverpool road to the back road leading from Annapolis to Bear River, commencing at the Township Line at or near Mickey Hill, thence following said line to Small Grand Lake, thence in a direct line to the said back road near Beeler's Mill, it is ordered, That a precept do issue and be directed to Bernard Calnek, James Copeland and John Pines as a Committee, directing them to enquire into the property and necessity of laying out said road, as prayed for, and if necessary and proper to lay out the same in manner prescribed by Law.

Upon reading and considering the Petition of T. W. Chesley and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for the extension of the road leading from the Chute Cross Road westward to the Phinney Mountain road, it is ordered, That a precept do issue and be directed to Hiram Young, J. B. Longmire and Bernard Calnek as a Committee, directing them to enquire into the property and necessity of said alteration, as prayed for, and if necessary and proper to lay out the same in manner prescribed by Law.

Upon reading and considering the Petition of Joseph Potter and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for a road in the Township of Clements, beginning at a fine tract of forty roods, about one mile east of the Victory settlement, and running a south southeast course, crossing the Flanders Bog at the Narrows, touching at Lake Torment, and coming out at Munroe's on the Liverpool road, it is ordered by the Court, That a precept do issue and be directed to John H. Harris, Thomas Milbury and William D. Long as a Committee, directing them to enquire into the property and necessity of said road, as prayed for, and if necessary and proper to lay out the same in manner prescribed by Law.

Upon reading and considering the Petition of Charles H. Ford and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for a new road, commencing from the road running through Maitland, between Frederick, Winot and Edward McBride's, running a northeast course, passing a small settlement about one and a half miles from Maitland, to a fine tract of farming land some two miles further on, it is ordered, That a precept do issue and be directed to William Duke-shire, Edward McMorris and Simon Freeman as a Committee, directing them to enquire into the property and necessity of said road, as prayed for, and if necessary and proper to lay out the same in manner prescribed by Law.

Upon reading and considering the petition of H. C. Bruce and others, in reference to an alteration in road districts Nos. 54 and 69, it is ordered, That John L. Morse, who lives at the junction of said districts, do hereafter perform his Statute in said District No. 54, in accordance with the prayer of said petition.

Ordered by the Court, That the order passed by this Court at the October Term, 1873, in reference to cattle going at large, be continued, and that in publishing the proceedings of the present Term the said order be published in connection herewith.

To His Honor, the Honorable Adam O. Archibald, Lieut-Governor of New Scotia, and Members of the Executive Council: The undersigned having been appointed a Committee by the unanimous vote of the Court of Sessions in October last past to memorialize the Government for the removal of Geo. R. Grassie, Esquire, Prothonotary of this County, would respectfully, but urgently represent to Your Honor and the Executive Council, the necessity for the immediate removal of that officer, as all the reasons which existed for his removal a year ago, remain in full force, indeed circumstances have transpired during the interval, which render his removal now even more imperative than it was then.

Your Memorials would, therefore, on behalf of the whole body of Magistrates convened at the October Sessions, in 1877, express the hope that the Government will act in the above matter without delay. We do not deem it necessary to say more on the premises, as the Government are already in possession of all necessary information bearing upon the subject.

Ordered, That Collectors of the County Rate be instructed to pay in one third the amount of their Rate Rolls on or before the first day of June next ensuing, and the balance of said Rate Rolls thirty days previous to the setting of the October Term of Sessions, 1878.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Peace be instructed to call the attention of the Public to the fact that all Town and County Officers are required to be sworn in within fourteen days after the Lists have been posted.
