Sugar Market.

Montreal, May 23.—The increased demand for refined sugars having far outstripped the supply, the values advanced, a further rise of 40 cents having been reported from Montreal yesterday, and it is stated that nothing was to be had under 80c. The granulated very firm at the recent advance to 100 cents. Buyers have not yet been able to supply wants. The refiners have sold continuously ahead, and are doing their utmost to meet the general wants of the trade. The sugar was very firm, with a strong upward tendency.
