Sonship was the man in the gospel who brought his dumb child to Christ, that it might receive speech,—the sons had done likewise—the Division room was the safest retreat under the sun for a poor sinner"-which last remarks caused one of your own brethren in the ministry and in the sons, to look at the speaker with astonishment, and say to me in a low tone, The sat beside me, V'I doubt that very much, and if I speak I will notice that." In my address I respectfully requested permission to differ from the brother stating, that with the fertility of this age in invention, it was fruitful in some instances in raising human institutions if not above, at least to an equality with those that were divine—and that whatever might be the gentleman's meaning, his words were liable to such construction; that the mercy-seat of God was a decidedly safer retreat than the Division room—that temperate institions however good in their place, should be subordinate, and hold a secondary place in the gospel, that total abstinence was not enjoined by any express command of God, and should therefore rest as a basis on the principle of expediency, and when you raise it to a higher elevation, you cannot maintain your position .-Now, Sir, I am right glad that you have called forth a full revelation of these facts.
