Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Andre: With regard to projections of future costs, I remind the Member of the National Energy Program prediction of \$80 a barrel oil.

Mr. Orlikow: And you believed that.

Mr. Andre: Bear that in mind when you predict the future. Let us take this Bill to committee where we can consider the assumptions made in those projections. Hopefully we will come up with a more rational and reasonable evaluation. That is all I am asking.

REGIONAL INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION

ALLOCATION OF FUNDS TO SMALLER PROVINCES

Mr. Lorne Nystrom (Yorkton—Melville): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Deputy Prime Minister. I am sure the Deputy Prime Minister is aware that since the Conservative Party took office in September, 1984, employment growth in Atlantic Canada has gone up by only 3 per cent, while in Ontario it has risen by some 7 per cent. Despite those figures, the overwhelming majority of moneys of the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion has gone to Ontario and Quebec. Does the Government have any plans at all to increase the budget of the Department so that the smaller provinces receive their fair share of money for regional expansion programs?

Hon. Michel Côté (Minister of Regional Industrial Expansion): Mr. Speaker, I have already answered this question. I said earlier today that since 1984 this Government has helped the regions more than any other previous administration ever did.

I referred as well to some of the initiatives taken by our Government, and I should like to remind my colleague that he need only read the Speech from the Throne to see that again we are committed to continue helping the regions. We have already announced the establishment of the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency and made it clear we intend to diversify the western economy.

In my opinion, Mr. Speaker, we are making a sustained effort to help various regions of Canada.
