It ought also to be mentioned, that this volume of Travels is not the ephemeral production of an ordinary Tourist; but has been composed from the continual observations of a gentleman, who has resided in Canada nearly twenty years. From the author's preface it appears, that his original design was to convey an idea of some of the picturesque scenery of the St. Laurence, which is one of the largest and most wonderful bodies of fresh water on the earth; but when he had resolved to present his remarks and sketches to the British public, he made the text more perfect and interesting, by adding to
