

NO PARTISANSHIP IN UNIVERSITY

Hon. W. H. Hearst Urges
Students Against Forming
Political Parties.

KEEP BREADTH OF VIEW

Men Leaving College Should
Not Have Fixed Political
Opinions.

Before entering upon a discussion of the platform laid down by the Conservative party of University College, in an address before the Conservative students yesterday evening, Hon. W. H. Hearst, minister of lands, forests and mines, declared his opinion that the members of the Literary Society had acted unwisely in changing their former party lines to Liberal and Conservative and Socialist. He believed the result might be the making of a hidebound partisanship. Party politics in Ontario are in such a state today, and the question of policy is so subject to modification that he deemed it better that university students should not actively identify themselves with any particular party until they studied the situation closely for some years. It was especially desirable, he said, that men going out into the world from a university should possess a breadth of view in keeping with their superior education. However, the minister stated that he did not wish it to be understood that he condemned the action of the society in making the change, and he hoped the students would so conduct themselves in political matters as to avoid the development of strong partisanship.

The view expressed by Mr. Hearst is becoming more generally held by a section of the student body, as the contest of party strife proceeds. A number of students, while acknowledging sympathy with Liberal, Conservative and Socialist principles, are anxious to see an independent element established in the society. For that reason representatives from each of the three parties met and formed a committee last night, with the avowed purpose of putting an independent candidate in the field when nominations are received at the regular meeting of the Lit. tonight.

DUKE AND DUCHESS TO VISIT ENGLAND

Will Leave in Spring and May
Not Return to Can-
ada.

OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—The Duchess of Connaught will return to England in the spring. The following bulletin was issued at Rideau Hall this morning: "Her royal highness is making steady progress towards recovery, and it is hoped that their royal highnesses will be able to return to Ottawa at no distant date."

"It is proposed that the duchess should return to England in the spring for further medical advice. His royal highness will accompany her, going home on leave of absence."

"The date of their royal highnesses' return to Canada cannot be definitely fixed, as the date of their departure and the length of the governor-general's leave of absence has not yet been determined."

The term of the Duke and Duchess was arranged for two years, but it was thought that this would be extended. The two years will be up in October, and in view of the announcement made today, there is some speculation as to whether the royal party will return to Canada at all.

LAND VALUATORS DIFFER GREATLY

Real Worth of Mimico Radial
Line Causes Worry to
Arbitrators.

ESTIMATES AWAY OFF

Over One Hundred Thousand
Dollars' Difference of
Opinion Exists.

What should the city pay to expropriate the Mimico section of the Toronto and York Radial? According to the company, the price should be \$148,000. The city says the property is not worth a cent more than \$32,000, which is a difference of \$116,000. The arbitration proceedings before the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board are still in progress. For several hours yesterday the board listened to and debated on the testimony submitted by the valuers for both parties.

Sydney H. Small and H. R. Frankland, the company's expert land valuers, presented the figure of \$148,000 as the correct sum that the city should pay for the property. This price was fixed on a basis of \$2.55 per square foot for 54,000 square feet, the total area of the property. This price staggered Mr. Geary, corporation counsel, representing the city in the proceedings, who declared that it was decidedly too large.

The city's valuator, Douglas Ponton, another real estate expert, concluded that the strip of land, 1-1/2 miles in length, was worth \$22,000, or 35 cents per square foot. The property is located between Sunnyside and the Humber along the Lake Shore road, and Mr. Ponton believed that his estimate was about the right price, as he based it on what the G. T. R. had to pay for the land for its new tracks, and Mr. Ponton believed that the property for the railway company. After listening to much argument, the board adjourned for a few days.

DUROCHER SURRENDERS TO POLICE OF OTTAWA

Sensational Disclosures of Crook-
edness in Civic Elections Com-
ing to Light.

OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—(Can. Press).—Charged with stuffing ballot boxes in the municipal elections, Joseph Durocher, for whom a warrant had been issued, surrendered to the police today and was released on \$2000 bail.

Four others, V. Dumoulin, N. Lafleur, George Macneil and Albert Benoit, were arraigned and remanded on charges of having voted illegally while a warrant was ordered for John Philippe, who did not appear on summons.

Startling revelations of ballot box stuffing, ballot switching and impersonation are coming to light. In one poll 25 ballots it is alleged, were in the box for Lavender, defeated mayoralty candidate, before the poll was opened. Names of 25 electors, who did not vote, appeared on the list of ballots.

Durocher is the son of a highly-respected ex-mayor, and is a local customs officer.

Further arrests and revelations are likely. Ellis declares corruption of this kind has also been carried on in parliamentary elections here in the past few years.

GOOD ROADS PLAN FOR WELLINGTON

County Council Considers a
Proposal to Expend Half-
Million Dollars.

GUELPH, Jan. 30.—(Special).—That the County of Wellington has a progressive council is shown in the fact that they have undertaken to recommend a good roads scheme of some magnitude. The report of a special committee appointed at the December session to look into the matter of good roads was presented today, and provides for the spending of \$500,000 on county roads in the County of Wellington, debentures to be issued in order to secure the money. It is not proposed to raise all this money at one time, but only as it is needed, say \$100,000 at a time, so that the county will not have to pay interest on the entire amount at one time. The county now owns one complete road machinery outfit, but if this proposition goes thru it is proposed to purchase four or five more and get to work on a large scale, the present system being considered too slow.

Some Criticisms.
Following the reading of the report W. F. Maclean of Toronto addressed the council, going into considerable detail in the proposed scheme, and pointing out where the county and every farmer in it would be benefited. He was followed by J. J. Morrison of Peel Township. Mr. Morrison is secretary of the Dominion Grange, and was recently appointed their organizer. He was in favor of good roads, but was strongly opposed to the scheme as it was outlined. His principal objections were that the owners of automobiles would get the most benefit from the roads without being properly taxed, and that there were not enough wires to make the winter roads better and more passable.
