

LAND OWNERS URGE EARLY SETTLEMENT

For Their Property Expropriated by New Welland Ship Canal.

STORM WORKS DAMAGE

Death of Ex-Warden Wiley of Lincoln—Has Filled Many Offices.

ST. CATHARINES, Feb. 1.—Capt. William F. Wiley, the third ex-warden of the County of Lincoln to die in the past month, passed away at his home in Louth Township, Saturday evening, at the age of 67 years. Capt. Wiley had been an officer of the Welland Canal Field Battery, and was a veteran of the Fenian raid. Born in Saintnet, he had resided in Louth for 55 years. He was twice married and leaves a family of one son and one daughter. Capt. Wiley had held many offices. He was a past president of the Lincoln County Conservative Association, and former reeve, tax collector and assessor for the Township of Louth.

Want Government to Act.
Numerous farmers and fruit growers in Grantham Township, whose property has been expropriated by the Dominion Government for the route of the Welland Ship Canal without compensation, who dislike the prospect of having their claims drag for years thru the exchequer court, met on Saturday night at the residence of Mr. J. J. Lancaster, M.P., urging an immediate settlement. Mr. Lancaster promised to carry their demands to Ottawa. The delegation was non-political in its make-up.

Unionists for Bill.
Dr. Joseph, M.L.A. for Lincoln, was waited upon by a delegation from the various trades unions of St. Catharines and district last night and urged to give his support to the Meredith compensation bill. Dr. Joseph had previously received requests from various manufacturers of the district to take a contrary stand. The delegation was given no intimation as to his stand. Saturday night's storm played considerable havoc with the transmission wires in the Niagara district, and left many houses and business places in darkness. In the fruit belt the limbs were blown from numerous trees. Repair gangs worked all day to restore the light service for to-night.

WRECKING OPERATIONS OVER MILLION DOLLARS

Steamship Values Salvaged at Port of Sania Since Date of Great Lake Storm.

SARNIA, Feb. 1.—The steel work of the roof of the new waterworks on the lake shore is being placed in position. The other parts of the big plant are being rushed as fast as conditions will permit, and it is expected that the machinery will be installed and ready for the opening of the system in June or early July.

The government wireless station at Point Edward is now working only on a day shift until the opening of navigation, when an all-night service will be started again. The local station has been in touch with the station at Port Colborne, and can reach Kingston when it is necessary.

Over a million dollars in steamship values represents the salvage operations at this point since Nov. 3. The steamers that have been salvaged are the Matos, Acadian, Northern Queen, Nottingham, Nicholas, Buckley, and Matthew Andrews. With the exception of the Andrews, all of these can be classed as wrecks, and were cast upon the rocks or beach as a result of the terrible storm that swept the great lakes.

EAST MISSOURI WANTS IT

Taking Steps to Have London-St. Mary's Radial Pass Thru Township.

ST. MARY'S, Feb. 1.—(Special.)—The Township of East Missouri has authorized the reeve to take up the matter of getting the proposed hydro-radial from London to St. Mary's to pass thru the township and to go into the question with the several municipalities concerned, with a view to having a definite project placed before the electors of East Missouri.

There was \$25,000 more freight business from St. Mary's over the C.P.R. during 1912 than in 1911.

The St. Mary's Cement Company has spring orders ahead. It is stated, for 250,000 barrels of cement.

OCTOGONARIAN'S DEATH.

BELLEVILLE, Feb. 1.—(Special.)—Mr. Richard Taylor, aged 86 years, who was born in this city and had lived here all his life, died on Saturday. She was the granddaughter of Captain J. B. Taylor, one of the first settlers in Belleville.

LIBERALS HOLD DURHAM BUT MAJORITY REDUCED

Labor Candidate Polled Nearly as Many Votes as Unionist.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—(Can. Press.)—At a by-election in Northwest Durham today, Aneurin Williams, Liberal, was elected, receiving 7241 votes. The Unionist candidate got 5564 votes. A labor candidate was in the field for the first time and polled 5026 votes. At the last general election in this constituency, the Liberal candidate received 8498 votes, while 4827 ballots were cast for the Unionist candidate. The election was occasioned by the appointment of the sitting member, L. A. Atterley Jones, to a London judgeship.

BELLEVILLE RESIDENT DEAD.

BELLEVILLE, Feb. 1.—(Special.)—James Cummins, harness manufacturer of this city, died yesterday, aged 80 years. For 64 years he had resided here. He took an active interest in municipal matters, was for years a member of the separate school board, and at one time was assistant chief of the fire department.

CHURCH REOPENING.

BELLEVILLE, Feb. 1.—(Special.)—Bridge Street Methodist Church, which has undergone extensive improvements amounting to several thousand dollars, was reopened today. Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent of the Methodist Church, preached the dedicatory sermon.
