

Three Prairie Provinces' Yield of Wheat Valued At a Hundred Millions

Canadian Press Despatch.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 1.—The Manitoba Free Press publishes today its annual estimate of the crop yield of the three prairie provinces, the feature of which is the total wheat yield of 134,500,000 bushels, and a selling value of all grades of \$100,000,000. The report is a very encouraging one in view of the many adverse conditions from which the crop has suffered. Drought, frost, black rot, and in some districts cut-worms, have all taken their toll, little or big, of the 1914 crop.

MONTREAL GRAIN MARKET.

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—Prices on the local grain market were unchanged, with very little doing. Oats over the cable were unchanged, but business was reported. Demand for flour from over the cable was good, several enquiries being received for full cargoes for shipment to outside ports. In addition to orders for round lots of all grades from London; but as millers at present are taxed to their full capacity, no business was reported. The local market is very active and firm. Milling is scarce and wanted.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 1.—Wheat prices opened irregular this morning and were generally lower in sympathy with markets south of the line. Opening figures were 1/2c lower to 1/4c higher for wheat, and 1/2c to 1/4c for oats, while oats were unchanged. Receipts show a rapid increase. Melons again flooded the market yesterday, and sold at 25c to 40c for the 11's, and 50c to 55c for the 12's.

The plums now being shipped in are of very good quality. Yesterday some of the best brought 50c per 11-quart basket, the more ordinary ones selling at 45c to 48c, while the half-baskets brought from 20c to 25c.

Bellamy & Son had a good shipment of Golden Drop plums from Udel of Grimsby. Pears are very plentiful, the best quality Bartlett's selling at 40c to 50c per 11-quart basket, the Flemish Beauties 35c to 40c, and Clapp's Favorite 40c.

D. Spence had some especially good Bartlett's from S. E. Mull, Niagara.

The peaches are not of very good quality. Yesterday the 11-quart lenos sold at 90c to 1.10, and the 12's at 85c to 90c.
