the feas. 2. Offences profecuted by appeal. 3. Common nuifances. 4. Offences against popular or penal statutes, after information brought by a subject. Nor is his pardon pleadable to an impeachment by the commons in parliament.

SECT. XXXII. Of execution.

- (1.) Execution is the completion of human punishment, and must be strictly performed in the manner which the law directs.
- (2.) The warrant for execution is formetimes under the hand and feal of the judge; fometimes by writ from the king; fometimes by rule of court; but commonly by the judge's figning the calendar of prifoners, with their feparate judgments in the margin.

MISCELLANEOUS ARTICLES.

York the present capital of Upper-Canada was but a few years ago a wilderness. The following description of it is taken from the Topographical account of Upper-Canada, published in 1799.

York (Toranto or lake Ontario) is in about 43 degrees and 35 minutes of north latitude, and is the prefent feat of government of Upper Canada. It is most beautifully situated within an excellent harbour of the same name, made by a long peninfula, which confines a bason of water, fufficiently large to contain a confiderable fleet; on the extremity of the peninfula which is called Gibral. far Point, are commodious stores and block-houses, which command the entrance to the harbour: on the main land, opposite to the point, is the garrison, situated in a fork made by the harbour and a finall rivulet, which

being improved by fluices, affords an eafy accels for boats to go up to the ftores; the barracks being built on a knoll, are well firuated for health, and command a delightfull prospect of the lake to the west, and of the harbour to the east. The Government house is about two miles above the garrifon, near the head of the harbour, and the town is increasing rapidly; the river Don empties itself into the harbour a little above the through a marsh, town, running which when drained will afford most beautiful and fruitful meadows. has already been commenced in a fmall degree, which will no doubt encourage further attempts. The long beach or peninfula, which affords a most delightful ride, is considered so healthy by the Indians, that they refort to it whenever indisposed; and so foon as the bridge over the Don is finished, it will of course be most generally reforted to, not only for pleafure, but as the most convenient road to the heights of Scarborough. The ground, which has been prepared for the government-house, is fituated between the town and the river Don, on a most beautiful spot, the vicinity of which is well fuited for gardens and a park. The oaks are in general large; the foil is excellent, and well watered with creeks, one of which, by means of a fhort dam, may be thrown into all the streets of the town. Vellels of all fizes may be conveniently built here, and a kind of terrace or second bank, in front of the town, affords an excellent fituation The remains of the for a rope walk. old French fort Toronto stand a little to the westward of the present garrifon, and the river Humber discharges itself into lake Ontario, about two miles and a half west of that; on this river and the Don are excellent mills, and all the waters abound in fish. In winter the harbour is frozen, and affords excellent ice for the amusement
