THREE MILLION TROOPS ON BRITISH ARMY LIST

In Addition Are Those Serving in India—Not Totals of Estimated Expenditure.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Feb. 5.—The army estimates, to which parliament will devote the first part of next week's session, give the number of effective men in the army, exclusive of those serving in India, at three million. There is this year a novel change in the form of the estimates, as no totals of estimated expenditures are given. The vote under each of the fifteen headings is set at the nominal figure of £1000. This gives the house of commons opportunity for the discussion of each heading while the government is spending whatever is necessary under these various headings to prosecute the war.

DRINK MORE WATER AND KEEP HEALTHY

One of the Most Simple and Yet Effective Ways of Stopping Disease.

The daily lectures in domestic science being given in Eaton's lunch room by Mrs. Wade are drawing increased audiences each day. The lecturer chose "Water" as her subject for discussion yesterday, and explained here talk its importance as a health preserver and aid to the work of the alimentary organs.

CARS TO CARRY LIMITED NUMBER

Strapholders Lessened to Fifty Per Cent. of Seating Capacity.

OPERATE LINE SOON

Bloor Street Civic Service to Commence About February Fifteenth.

The Toronto Railway Company is to make application to the railway board for an order to limit the number of people riding on cars. The order, if granted, will read: "That the carrying capacity of closed cars be limited to 50 per cent above seating capacity, and of open cars to the seating capacity."

City Solicitor Johnson says that the application for an extension of time by the Toronto Eastern Railway should be carefully watched, so that no additional rights may be secured.

PROVINCIAL FARMS RECORD GOOD YEAR

Heavy Crops Gathered From Farms in Connection With Institutions.

Official returns to the provincial secretary's department show that the provincial institutions are holding crops constituting records in many respects. The total production of the year was greatly in excess of any previous year, in spite of the withdrawing of many acres for buildings at Whitby. Nearly 500 more tons of corn were grown and potatoes also showed a great increase. The aim of the farm director is to increase the milk production of the herds, and corn and roots will be made a specialty in future.

The department will venture more deeply next year into beef production, and as subsidiary hay, oats and roots will be grown in great quantities.

NONSENSE FOR FARMER TO INCREASE AREA

"It is nonsense for the farmer of Ontario to increase the area of cultivation, but I claim that most of them would get better results by tilling less land to a more productive end," said President McLean of the Ontario Plovermen's Association at the annual convention held in the C.O.F. Hall yesterday morning. He also contended that the farmers were doing a most patriotic act in teaching and practicing better plowing.
