SUBURBAN AND YORK COUNTY HAPPENINGS

North Toronto Still Waits For Board of Control—Odd Accident Near Claremont.

NORTH TORONTO, Jan. 29.—(Special.)—Whether thru want of interest in matters municipal or thru lack of knowledge of the fact that a public meeting had been called for Saturday night, not enough were present in the town council to constitute a quorum, and the whole thing was called off. President Banton stated that something would be done to get more people to the next meeting, but he was not sure whether another meeting would be called in the near future or not. The townspeople are anxiously awaiting the long-deferred visit of the board of control, and incidentally chafing under the delay.

A lot of valuable time is being lost, and already a month has been frittered away since the property owners of North Toronto manifested in no uncertain way their desire for closer trade and social relations with the city, and so far not the first step has been taken by the city looking to an acceptance of the invitation of Mayor Brown and the council to visit the finest residential district around the city. It is contended by one or two that the progress of the town is not being materially hindered, but this is not borne out by facts. The townspeople were given to understand that something would be definitely done in a fortnight. The board of control might well make a little special effort to expedite matters.

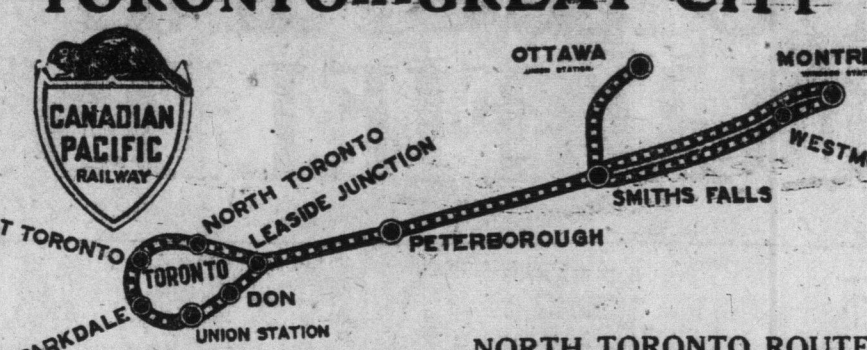
