MacDonald said he would not begin negotiations looking to putting Wells in the ring at London, or in some western city for this country, in a bout to be staged by Tex Rickard.

## UP TO CLOSE AT WINDSOR DENHAM WINS HANDICAP

Question Mark Lands Distance Event in Fast Time—Horses Going to Montreal.

WINDSOR, Sept. 1.—The Valley Farm Stable furnished the winner in today's feature race at Windsor, the Canadian Handicap, to which a purse of \$1200 was added, conditions calling for Canadian-bred horses. Denham made a snow of his field, and carried 100 weight, 125 pounds, made all of his own pace and won in a romp. Question mark applied the easy victor of Wednesday by running the mile and a sixteen-hundredths in runaway fashion. McChesney rode the first three winners in the mile maiden race.
