LICENSE REDUCTION FIGHT AT MUNICIPAL ELECTION

Question Will Be Made an Issue on New Year's Day and Every Three Years Thereafter, if Present Arrangements Carry.

License reduction is to be made an issue by the Toronto "drys" at the next municipal election and the temperance issue is to be raised every three years hereafter in the Toronto civic arena.

WEST TO SECEDE? SIR RICHARD PROPHETIC

Government Proposes to Make Northwest Bear "Good Roads" Burden of the East, While Denying the Former Access to Markets of United States, He Contends.

OTTAWA, March 18.—That the government's "good roads" bill will begin close to wrecking confederation within four years by making the west bear the financial burdens of the east after the latter had denied it access to the U. S. markets, was the solemn prediction made by Sir Richard Cartwright in the senate to-day.

Sir Richard declared that Ontario had been in a miserable state of atrophy from 1851 to 1901, and any prospect that it had now was due mainly to the markets of the northwest, yet it had repaid the latter by lending itself to the most foolish prejudice and by allowing itself to be made the tools of a set of selfish scoundrels who cared for nothing except further lining their already well lined pockets.

That was the rock on which the union of the two Canadas was all but split in 1864. Now if the government chooses to deliberately, needlessly and with little consideration set to work to undo what has been done with pains and trouble during the last fifty years, I verily believe that the next fifty months will see the whole of this confederation, from end to end, in very much the same position that the two Canadas were when I first took my seat in parliament in 1863.
