

## Fight Frank Moran Out in Third

## FRED FULTON WINS IN THE THIRD ROUND

From P. Moran in What Was  
Scheduled for Twenty-  
Round Bout.

New Orleans, Feb. 25.—Fred Fulton, of Boston, and Frank Moran, of Pittsburgh, in the first of their scheduled 20-round fight here tonight. Moran's right eye was badly cut by Fulton's first round jab and the cut was opened wide during the second period.

In the third round opened Moran seemed to have great difficulty in making his opponent. After a clinch, in which Fulton landed a couple of right uppercuts and jabs to Moran's chin, and body without a return blow being struck, Fulton landed a hard right cross to Moran's jaw.

Moran fell on all fours and his seconds rushed in to the ring. After being accorded a technical knockout.

Moran started the first round by rushing in with a series of hard right hooks to the face, following with left and right swings to the head. Fulton parried with his left and right hands to Morans body and a right cross that cut just above the Pittsburgh man's right eye. In the second round Moran opened with hard jabs to Fulton's ribs, followed by a shower of

After driving Fulton into a corner he lashed repeated right and left hooks to the big fellow's head, Fulton seeming to intentionally take punishment.

Fulton, suddenly taking the offensive, landed a heavy right to the center of the ring with vicious lead and swings to the body and head. With the blow covered with blood from the wound over his eye and with his right eye closed Moran appeared in distress when the count was called.

With Moran hanging onto him shortly after the opening of the third round Fulton landed numerous right and left uppercuts after which the clinch followed. Fulton sent a hard right cross to Moran's jaw and the latter dropped helpless. Two minutes and thirty seconds elapsed when Moran's seconds threw in the sponge.

Fulton had several cuts about his face and the words "the winner" were right over Moran was scarcely marked.

Sammy Goldman of New Orleans was referee.

Fulton weighed 215 pounds and Moran 198 pounds.

Millwaukee, Wis. Feb. 25.—Jack Dempsey, the San Francisco heavyweight, won from Bill Brennan here tonight in the sixth round of a ten-round fight. The referee stopped the bout to save Brennan from a knock-out.

Dempsey had the advantage from start to finish. He floored Brennan four times in the first round and a referee's time-keeper was saved a probable knockout by the bell. The Californian had a shift in strategy in the second round, when Dempsey was equally clever with either hand and landed almost at will. Brennan suffered a fourth and a fifth knock-out in the third, fourth and fifth sessions, but in the sixth and final round Dempsey lands a shower of lefts and rights, and a left to the chin, causing Brennan to take nine of the count. Brennan was game, but he was out of his mind. He was on the verge of landing a knockout blow on his wobbling opponent, he was, but he was not. He was saved by the bell in the fourth round.

The man fought at catch weights, bringing the beam at 195 and Dempsey at 183½.

**M. O'DOWD SHADES H. GREB.**

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 25.—Newspaper critics gave Mike O'Dowd of St. Paul claimant of the middleweight championship, a shade over Harry Greb of Pittsburgh, as the one of the ten round bout here tonight. Greb did most of the leading, but could not get inside O'Dowd's left.


O'Dowd fought a strong defensive battle, forcing Greb frequently to swing and miss. Greb was the aggressor and left. He broke ground repeatedly before the Pittsburgh man, dodging Greb's attacks.

The bout was fast. O'Dowd played for Greb's ribs in the earlier rounds, getting in a few good shots, but was somewhat slown that appeared damaging.

In the ninth, with the crowd calling for a knockout, Greb landed his best blow, but Greb skillfully covered and clinched.

Cincinnati, Feb. 25.—The cigar team of St. Paul went into the lead in the five-man event on the first shift of the American Bowling Congress tonight by rolling 3023. This is 114 pins ahead of the champion Spark Plug team of Toledo, who had been leading up to this time, and only 39 pins behind the Amer-
