

HOUSING LOANS FOR LANDOWNERS

Dominion Government Lends Money for Provincial Housing.

FAVORABLE TERMS

Monthly Repayment at Five Per Cent.—Small Cash Deposit.

Further details of the Ontario Housing proposition were announced yesterday by J. A. Ellis, of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

The Dominion Government has agreed to make a loan to the provincial government to assist in the work, and the province will in turn loan money to municipalities.

It has been decided that where a loan is to be made to a housing company, it shall not exceed 85 per cent of the value of the land and buildings to be constructed.

Only Landowners. Municipalities are not to make loans to individuals, firms or companies, except companies incorporated as before mentioned, and to persons who own their own land and desire to erect houses thereon for their own occupation, and to farmers for the erection of houses for their employees.

Also to a person for the erection of a house on land owned by the municipality, provided he contributes in cash the value of the lot or 10 per cent of the whole cost.

Monthly Repayment. Municipalities are to repay the province monthly at the same rate as the above monthly repayments.

Housing companies are to repay a municipality in the same way, and to give the municipality a mortgage upon all the land and houses for which the loan was secured.

Any municipality may come under the provisions of the proposed legislation after it is enacted, upon a by-law being passed by the council.

Receipts for the year were reported to be \$1,811,322 disbursements \$13,942,774, a balance of \$24,484 being left at the beginning of the year.
