The Directors beg to submit to the Shareholders of the Company their Ninth Annual Report, including Statement of Assets and Liabilities, as of The balance at the credit of Profit and Loss Account brought forward from 1904 amounts to \$203,320 44. To this has been auded the sum of \$497,898,68, being the Company's net profits from the operations of the year; also the sum of \$35,400,00, representing the premium received from final payments on the stock last issued, so that the income of the Company for the year is \$533,298.68 and the aggregate to the credit of Profit and Loss Account is \$736,619.12. From this amount the Directors have paid four dividends of 2 1.2 per cent. each, making 10 per cent for the year amount, ing in all to \$349,418.05 have transferred to the Reserve Fund the sum of \$35,400.00, representing the income derived from the premium on calls on the new stock, and have carried forward to 1906 \$351,801.07 to the credit of Profit and Loss Account. This amount represents the net profits of the Company from operations, after payment of dividends.

During the year there has been spent on improvements the sum of \$209,576.55, the larger portion of the expenditure being at Coal Creek, as the result of the destruction of the wooden tipple by fire on the 11th day of March last. This structure was replaced by a modern steel tipple, dump and screening plant, capable of handling 4000 tons of coal a day, at an expenditure of \$196,000.00.
