WILLIAM, THE WONDER. Downger Empress of Russia

The Marquise de Fontenoy writes: The public announcement that the Dowager Empress of Russia, who has just left St. Petersburg, will remain absent from the Muscovite sapital throughout the entire stay of Emperor William, is significant. There never has been much loye lost between the royal families of Denmark and Prussia, and the Dowager Czarina shares the aversion which her nusband invariably and publicly displayed for the young Kaiser. But what has accentuated her dislike for time is his conduct with regard to Greece and the nanner in which he has treated her brother, King George. Her ideas upon the subject are shared by most of the members of the reigning house of Russia, Queen Olga of Greece being very popular among them and, under the circumstances the welcome at the Russian court of the self-invited German Emperor is not characterized by much cordiality.

The position of Emperor William is unique among the monarchs of Europe. Whereas his father was the most popular prince of his day and welcome eyery wherever in that france which he had invaded in 1870. William alone cannot place his foot on French territory. He is afraid to go to England lest he should be subjected to outward and visible sizns of popular disfavor. He is so detested in the southern German states that the leading newspapers of the region no longer are handled by the Berlin news agencies for fear of incurring punishment, so velement is the abuse of the Emperor which they print. He could not travel in Greece, and the only capital where he would be heartily welcome is Constantinople. or Anyone Else.

Editor World: I have noticed lately several letters in reference to the useless expense in connection with the burial of the dead, and they reminded me of what I had to do with this matter for upwards of 40 years. I had a carpenter shop, and employed mechanics for upwards of 50 years, and had coffins made in my shop when required. We made them of white oak. I always kept a pile of three-quarter inch thick, of good oak for the purpose. My price was four dollars for the coffin, without any trimmings; and if the parties, were goor who required it I made no charge at all for trimmings: Lately I was surprised at the prices of coffins. I had to bury a poor old man that had lived with me many years, and I sent to the undertaker for a coffin, and found that for cheap coffins he had only two prices, \$18 and \$25. Consequently, I had to take the \$18 one, and pay for digging the grave, etc. Now, to remedy this eyil, we must have places, such as Eaton's or Simpson's, or such like places, where coffins can be procured at a fair price. This, I think, should be the first move, and with such men as Dr. Potts to assist, I think you may be sure of a satisfactory result.

EIGHTY-SEVEN MILLION DOLLARS

The Vast Increase in Purchases From the D. S. Last Year by Britishers. Washington, Aug. 12.—The total exports of merchandise, domestic and forcign, was \$1,050,987,253, or \$168,381,315 more than in the year 1895-6. Of this increase the United Kiugdom took \$77,513,647 more than in the former year; British North America increased its demands \$4,947,991 and British Australasia bought \$4,712,209. The total increase from these British buyers was about \$87,000,000, or more than half the entire increase of the year. There was an aggregate loss of exports to South America of \$2,529,178, that losses being in the exports to Bolivia, Brazil, Chili, the Gulanas, Peru, Uruguay and Venezuela. There was a sight increase of exports to Argentina and Equador.

SHARP ADVANCE IN WHEAT.

Wheat is very strong, with an active demand. The highest prices of the season were made yesterday. Old white wheat sold at 80c west and new at 77c for export. These prices are the best Ontario formers have obtained for a long time, and from 16c to 18c more than was paid a year ago.

In Chicago Sept. sold up to 84½c and Dec. to 83%c, advances of about 20c in five or six weeks. Sept. is higher than Dec., while it was 2c lower a few days ago. This sharp advance in September gives color to the theory that a "corner" may yet be worked in this option.

The shortage of the wheat crops in Europe is the basis for this advance. It is estimated that this season's yield over there will be 225 to 250 millions of bushels less than in 1896. The United States will have a larger crop than last year, but the Government report published on Wednesday was less favorable than the July report, and this probably has had something to do with the sharp rise in prices the past two days. The small stocks of wheat in elevators in the United States and Canada, the smallest in five years, is a very bullish factor. Foreigners have and are still buying large quantities of wheat on this side of the Atlantic, and now that prices are up many consider the situation a legitimate one.



The weather was fine and cool, and the butchers were cut strong, but trade was very slow for some time, as there were too many cattle on the market and the drovers were unwilling to concede all the decline in prices which the butchers wanted. There were really no prime beeves on the market, but pretty good stock was plentful, and brought fully ½c a pound lower prices than were given for similar cattle a week ago. The best cattle sold at about 4c per lb., with pretty good stock at from 3½c to 3½c, and some of the leaner beasts would scarcely bring 2c a lb. The prices of calves ranged from \$1.75 to \$6.25 each. Good veals seemed to be in active demand. Shippers are payinb about 3c a lb. for good large sheep. Lambs sold to-day at from 3½c to nearly 4c a lb. Fat hogs were more plentiful than they have been for some time, and prices have declined considerably. Light hogs, fed, sell at from 5%c to 5½c a lb. and the heavy hogs at from 4½c to 5c a lb.
