Montreal, March 31.—A Star special cable from London says:

"Fast mail matters are exciting much interest in Canadian circles. Mr. Dobell says he found on his arrival that the progress of Messrs. Petersen's arrangements was more satisfactory than he anticipated when in Canada. In other quarters it is confidently decared that the whole of the necessary capital has been underwritten. Mr. Petersen, himself, said to-day that he was too busy to make a statement, but it is noteworthy that meetings of his associates are being held.

"Mr. Cecil Rhodes arrived at Madeira today. In the course of a recent conversation he spoke most warmly of the service Canada had rendered to the empire by compelling the British Government to clear the German and Beigfan treaties out of the way of future inter-imperial co-operation. These treaties formerly blocked his way in his tariff arrangements in South Africa. Sir Wiffrid Laurier, he said, has now got rid of them for us and the whole empire."

Position. Cairo March 31.-It is announced in despatch from Atbara, on the Atbara gold commissioner for the Cassiar minin River, a branch of the Nile above Berber, that an important reconnaissance was started by the Anglo-Egyptian troops on Wednesday. Eight squadrons of cavalry, four maxim guns, a battery of horse artillery, two battallons of infantry and the whole of the mounted troops reconnoitered the Dervish position, 18 miles from Atbara, this morning and encountered 500 of the enemy's horsemen, whom they drove in, and, pressing forward, found Mahmoud's position, in the heavy bush, strongly entrenched, with pits filled with rifemen and protected by a thick zereba. In the centre was a small hill with three tiers of entrenchments filled with spearmen. The whole position was swarming with Dervishes, alert for the attack.

The artillery opened fire at 1000 yards. The effect was apparently good, but it was difficult to judge to a certainty, in consequence of the thick bush. The Maxims also swept the front of the position. The Dervishes, however, did not reply, evidently awaiting an attack at close quarters. Having ascertained the enemy's position, the reconnoitering force retired. followed by the Dervish horsemen, who did not attack, but retreated under shell fire.

SIR WILLIAM VAN HORNE

Says the Only Alternative Now is to Ar-Chilkat Route. Montreal, March 31.-When asked to-day for an expression of opinion regarding the Senate's rejection of the Yukon bill, Sir William Van Horne, president of the Canadian Pacific, made the following statement: "I would not on any account criticize the action of the Senate, but I am sorry the bill is rejected, and I fear it's rejection will prove to be a mistake, and that Canada will lose the cream of the Yukon trade. I have never doubted that the Chilkat was the best route, but the Teslin route seemed necessary to independence and to the saving of a whole year's trade if nothing more. If the freedom of the Chilkat route can be secured by arrangement with the United States, that now seems to be the only alternative."

The Provincial Government have decided to undertake the assay of gold dust in the city. They will mould dust into bars and give a certificate of its value. A circular letter has been sent to the banks, asking whether they would advance money on gold bars accompanied by these certificates, barring the Government agreeing to do so.
