Record Wheat Crop This Year. The speech from the throne refers to a bountiful harvest. It promises to be borne out by later developments. The crop report now being prepared by the Department of Agriculture will show a yield of about 25 bushels on an average to the acre in Ontario, as against about 25 bushels last year.

Went Street Railway Act Changed. Messrs. J. R. Hammett, Preston, Snyder, M. P. Moore and Fennel interviewed the Government at the council meeting yesterday afternoon, asking for a modification of the Street Railway Act. The provision which makes the obtaining of a charter dependent on the favorable signatures of half the ratepayers and two-thirds of the property owners is a source of annoyance to the promoters of the Preston-Berlin electric line.

ALWAYS TAKE THE G. T. R. WHEN YOU CAN. S. S. S.—SCENERY, SAFETY AND SPEED. TO FOSTER THE FRUIT TRADE. Chamberlain Wants Direct Communication Between Canada, Jamaica and London.

London, Aug. 2.—Speaking of the possibility of Government aid to the British West Indies, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, said in the House of Commons to-day that the Government's policy was not settled, pending the results of the reciprocity negotiations between the United States and the West Indies. Mr. Chamberlain said that he found United States officials very hard bargainers indeed, and it was uncertain whether Her Majesty's Government would be able to accept any of the terms offered by the West Indian colonies to be not destroyed.

Betts Told the Truth. Windsor, Ont., Aug. 2.—The watch stolen from John Betts' house in Windsor was recovered in Detroit to-day. William Betts, who was sent by the Provincial Police to Toronto to stand his trial on a charge of burglary, had told while in the "sweet-box" with his partner, Thomas Quinn, who was arrested in Toledo for stealing "bilious" in Detroit, had told the watch to a Detroit man. The two men are suspected of being responsible for all the jobs that have been done between Ottawa and Windsor.
