The Chinese Minister, accompanied by Sir Halliday MacAriney, Secretary of the Chinese Legation, has just gone to Rome to confer with the Italian Government on the question. No doubt a settlement will be arrived at, but the Chinese are very well acquainted with the relative power of the various European States, and are by no means disposed to meet Italian encroachments in the lamblike spirit they display toward those of Russia or Germany."
