WHAT TORONTO MUST DO TO SECURE A RADIAL RAILWAY SYSTEM.

We present on another page some interesting information in reference to Cleveland's suburban railway. It will be remembered that Mr. H. A. Everett was associated with Mr. William Mackenzie in the formation of the Toronto Railway Company some ten years ago. Shortly after the Toronto system was converted to electricity, Mr. Everett went back to Cleveland. Mr. Mackenzie remained in Toronto, and has ever since been the head and front of the Toronto Railway Company. Mr. Everett is the president of the Cleveland Electric Railway Company, known as the Big Consolidated. Mr. Everett confided his attention to electrical matters, and he is to be seen in the big suburban system of Cleveland. Mr. Mackenzie has had several other trams in the city, including such schemes as the Italy River Railway and the Yukon Railway, together with mining propositions and other projects all over the world. With Mr. Mackenzie, the local railway matter was a mere sideshow in comparison with his other schemes. In regard to suburban extension, he has done practically nothing except this—he has headed off everyone else from duplicating what has been accomplished in Cleveland. Mr. Mackenzie understands very well that there is a great future for suburban electric systems radiating from the large cities. It has not been convenient for him to go ahead with the Toronto radial system, but he has taken good care to erect gates at all the leading highways, so that no one can go ahead with the work. Mr. Mackenzie has put padlocks on these gates, and, having locked them and placed the keys in his pockets, he is going about unconcerned, attending to his other schemes. When it suits him he will open the gates and tell his men to go to work. But, in the meantime, he will neither go on with the radial idea himself, nor will he allow anyone else to do so. Toronto, from five to ten years behind all American cities in the extension of suburban lines. We ought to have as big a system as exists in Cleveland, where they have over 250 miles of suburban highways. These residents are in hourly and half-hourly communication with the merchants of that city. In our special article on this subject, we have sketched two maps, one showing the Cleveland suburban lines and the other showing the system that Toronto would have had if Mr. Mackenzie hadn't tied up the approaches to the city. There is no better territory in America for a suburban railway system than in the country surrounding Toronto. The district is a splendid agricultural one, has numerous summer resorts, and contains not a few thriving cities, towns and villages. Each of six lines that we have sketched on the map would pay good dividends on every dollar invested in them.

Toronto has waited long enough on Mr. Mackenzie. It has waited too long. Mr. Mackenzie won't make a move until he gets everything just as he wants it. He wants the city and the Legislature to tie up the Metropolitan in proper shape before he acquires it. He wants new franchises here and there. He wants existing franchises extended. When he has his hands on everything, then he will make a move. Judging from his indifference in the past, it may be five or ten years longer before our radial system is established. If we rely upon Mr. Mackenzie.

But, we take it, the city is not altogether helpless in the matter. If the City Council will only wake up, we may secure a radial system independently of Mr. Mackenzie. Mr. Mackenzie cannot carry freight to the centre of Toronto over any of his prospective lines without the consent of the city. That in itself is a powerful lever to start with. Then it is a fact that Mr. Mackenzie has not secured franchises on all the highways leading into Toronto, nor has he franchises exclusive on such lines as he possesses. His gates can be broken down.

THIS TAKES THE CAKE.
 Montreal Star: The excessive rates which are being charged, it is stated, in hotels for board and lodgings at present, formed the topic of conversation in hotel circles last evening. A prominent Montrealer visited Buffalo recently on his wedding trip, and when settling his account was horrified at having to pay \$10 a piece per day for himself and his wife, and this for a modest room and without including meals. A plain breakfast, which his wife had in the hotel one morning cost \$5. And this at a time when the hotelier is expected to charge \$4 and \$5.50 per day. Other hotels not considered first-class by any means are charging complex \$7.50 a piece per day.
