Sheppard presented a great case on behalf of the Council of Control in recommending the settlement, but was opposed by Ald. Oliver.

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NOT AFFECTED BY THE GERMS.

Young Lady Inoculated With Tuberculosis Germs Quite Healthy.

New York, Nov. 25.—Dr. George D. Barney's attempt to demonstrate that Professor Koch was in error in stating that tuberculosis germs were not communicable from a cow to a human being appears to have resulted in a demonstration that the German scientist was right, as Miss Emma H. King, the young woman whom Dr. Barney inoculated with germs taken from the mammary glands of a tuberculous cow, was reported by him to be in good health last evening.

Dr. Barney, however, still insists that Professor Koch was mistaken, and expresses the belief that the symptoms of tuberculosis will still manifest themselves in the subject of the experiment. He says that even now there is a slight indication that it is by no means satisfactory, but admits that he expected the disease to show itself within ten days after the inoculation, which occurred two weeks ago last Saturday.

Dr. Barney says the organs which would be attacked by the tuberculous germ were in such perfect condition that they offered great resistance. He expects that the disease will manifest itself within a week.
