The department will arrange where an owner desires to retain his number while changing his machine, to issue a new ilcense and change the number upon application. Changes of ownership must be at once notified to the department, and all vehicles will be kept account of.

The main changes, however, relate to vehicles owned by manufacturers and dealers, and not used by them for their own private purposes or for hire. Before the act was amended such vehicles were not required to hold a permit or to exhibit a market.
