BASEBALL.

ONE BIG LEAGUE.
President Hart, of the Chicago club, has come to the front with a plan which he says will be the ultimate solution of the baseball problem. "From my point of view," he is quoted as saying, "there will be one big league that will control baseball all over the country. It will probably be made up of Boston, Brooklyn, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, and St. Louis. With Washington, Baltimore, Louisville and Cleveland forced out by legitimate means, there will be a chance to organize two formidable minor leagues to embrace all other cities worth having. The Eastern and Atlantic league circuits are not any too strong, but a combination of the best cities in these organizations together with Baltimore and Washington, would shape up a fine circuit. A first-class league could be made up as follows: Providence, Springfield, Syracuse, Buffalo, Newark, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington. In case Buffalo wanted to stick to the Western League, Toronto could come in and make the Eastern circuit even more compact. So far as the Western League is concerned, another convenient circuit could be mapped out as follows: Buffalo, Cleveland, Detroit, Milwaukee, Louisville, Indianapolis, Minneapolis and St. Paul. By such an arrangement the big league, through the medium of the National agreement and the board of arbitration, would really control baseball in nearly two dozen cities of prominence in the United States, so that there could be little friction and little or no chance for rival leagues. The project has been laid before certain eastern and western men, and they have promised to think it over."

NO SUNDAY GAMES AT PITTSBURGH.

Pittsburgh, Dec. 28.—The Pittsburgh baseball club will not play Sunday ball next year. President Kerr, who has always been opposed to Sunday games, has received word from Vice-President A. L. Aulen, of Chicago, that he, too, was tired of Sunday games and was in favor of a return to the old regime. President Young, of the league, has been notified to not include Pittsburgh in the Sunday schedule for next season.

THE COLORED MEN WIN.

New York, Dec. 28.—Joe Gans, of Baltimore, outpointed Jack Dwyer, of Wilmington, Del., in a 25-round bout at 145 pounds, before the Lenox A. C. last night, and Referee White decided in favor of the colored boxer from Baltimore. The referee's decision did not suit many of the spectators, and was in the contest, but the conservative judges agreed that the colored boy was entitled to the verdict. The preliminary bout was a slugging match, which lasted nearly four rounds. Jim Janey, a colored boxer from Baltimore, and Dan Sullivan, of Boston, were the principals. From the word "go" they swung on each other with both hands without a moment's let-up. In the fourth round the referee stopped the fight, and gave the decision to Janey.

CHOYNSKI COULD NOT FIGHT.

JUSTIN S. MORRILL

Vermont's Veteran Senator Dead—A Victim to Grip.

Washington, Dec. 28.—Senator Justin Smith Morrill died shortly after midnight. In his death the senate has lost its senior member in point of service, and its oldest in age. He had served continuously in the senate for more than 31 years, and he was 88 years old on April 14 last.

Senator Morrill, who was born in Stratford, Vt., April 14, 1810, in early life was a merchant and later an agriculturist. He was elected to the House of Representatives in the 34th congress, and for four succeeding terms. He was transferred to the senate as a Union Republican, taking his seat on March 4, 1867. Since that time he served as chairman of the committee on ways and means, the principal committee of the house, and at the critical time of especial importance.

STARS AND STRIPES

Patriotic Peddler Made a Pot of Money in Havana Out of "Old Glory."

Havana, Dec. 28.—The citizens of Havana read in their morning papers an order from Capt. Gen. Castellanos permitting the display of Cuban and American flags inside the lines of Spanish jurisdiction, and early yesterday morning the Stars and Stripes floated over many buildings in the heart of the city and in streets where the Spanish soldiers still kept guard.

Fear of the Spaniards disappeared with the appearance of this order, for out came thousands of flags secretly made by the women of the households or clandestinely purchased from adventurous peddlers.

Robert A. Scott, formerly city treasurer of Jacksonville, Fla., succeeded in getting a small cargo of flags into Havana some weeks ago, and flags originally costing about 4 cents have been selling for about 40 cents each.
