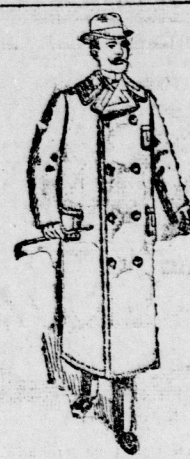

Seven Cars Derailed Near Attercliffe on the M. C. R.

—Large Shipment of Eggs From St. Marys—Church Disturbers Fined—Woodstock Assessment Reduced \$27,800.

The Galt Y. M. C. A. will add a gymnasium to its equipment.

Three church disturbers were fined \$1 each in Brantford recently.

Mrs. Wm. Cureton died at her residence in Sandwich on Thursday.

The court of division has reduced the assessment of Woodstock \$27,800.

Rev. Mr. Hazlewood, of Paris, is recovering from his late serious illness.

There is a movement on foot to establish a local insurance company in Brantford.

The Cockburn Creamery Company, Limited, are applying for incorporation in Woodstock.

The death is announced at Cascade, B. C., of Alex. Mason, merchant tailor, formerly of St. Thomas.

The will of Mrs. Jane Bell, South Dumfries, has been probated. The estate is valued at \$9,000.

The will of the late Henry St. Louis, of Sandwich East, has been admitted to probate. The estate inventories \$30,000.

Mrs. Vidal, matron of the Indian school at Elkhorn, Man., and widow of the late William P. Vidal, of Sarnia, is dead.

The trustees of the Wellesley school received 151 applications to fill two vacancies that will occur at the end of the year.

Alex. Patterson, of Gananoque, formerly of St. Thomas, has been appointed accountant of the Merchants' Bank at Tilbury.

Fourteen thousand five hundred dollars' worth of Raleigh township delinquencies have been sold to F. Marx. The premium was over \$700.

The students of the Stratford model school will hold their annual "At

Home" on Friday of this week. Over 250 guests have been invited.

A couple of men have been visiting Hay township, Huron county, swamp to study its possibilities as to peat-bog for manufacture of commercial fuel.

The faculty of Assumption College, Sandwich, will extend an invitation to Papal Delegate Martelli to visit that institution during his stay in Detroit.

The J. D. Moore Company (Limited), of St. Marys, shipped 24,000 dozen of eggs to Great Britain last week, and 24,000 dozen more to the same destination this week.

One hundred acres of land on Chatham Plains were recently sold for \$3,200. Before this district was drained, thousands of acres could be bought for 75 cents an acre.

A company have purchased all the soft timber in the swamps west of Exeter, and intend erecting a saw mill there, which will give employment to a large number of hands.

Richard Jackson, who was accidentally killed on a railway near Exeter, N. Y., recently, formerly resided in St. Thomas, having married a daughter of Mrs. Bennett, of that city.

A very pretty wedding was celebrated at 8:30 Wednesday evening on John street, Ingersoll, when Miss Ellen, third daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Watson, was united in matrimony to Mr. T. Irvin Dynes.

The quarterly official board of the James Street Methodist Church at Exeter have decided to extend an invitation to Rev. Mr. Brown, of Amherstburg to become their pastor for the conference term, commencing June next.

A happy event took place on Wednesday night at the residence of Mr. Robt. Sutherland, West Zorra. About 30 friends and relatives gathered to witness the marriage of his daughter, Miss Nissouri, son of Mr. John Sutherland.

Paul Killer, of Clifton, was arrested by Officer Moynihan for scraping M. C. R. coaches with a stick. He was fined \$1 and \$3 costs. The damage amounted to \$10. People often thoughtless hold out sticks while a train is passing and rub off the paint. Detective Heenan is bound to put a stop to the practice.

William Bateman, who was one of the first Yukon traders, is in St. Thomas. After four months on the trail, Mr. Bateman arrived in Dawson City early last June with 50 tons of provisions, and had no trouble of getting rid of every pound of stuff at good prices—\$15 per 100 pounds for flour, for instance. He brought several bracelets and a watch chain made of gold nuggets, and plenty of gold dust and loose nuggets, one of them containing \$90 worth of gold.

Stratford Herald: A pretty wedding was celebrated Tuesday afternoon at the residence of Mrs. Dodson, when her only daughter, Miss Evelyn, was united in marriage to Mr. Chas. Dingman, of Chatham. The contracting parties are well known Stratfordites. Mr. Dingman being a brother of Mr. W. S. Dingman, of the Herald, and formerly of the Gananoque Journal, but now of Chatham. Miss Dobson is one of the most popular young ladies of the city.

On Thursday morning, as M. C. R. train known as "S. N. 2" dairy special, was nearing the station at Attercliffe, a wheel broke on the fifteenth car from the front end. In consequence seven cars were derailed. The cars were thrown across the double track, completely blocking traffic for some time. The auxiliary was dispatched to the scene of the accident, and soon cleared up the wreckage. The cars and contents were not badly damaged, so as not to delay passengers, express trains Nos. 14 and 15 were sent around on the Air Line. No person was hurt.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 13.—In order to secure her release from jail, Miss Helena Wende became the wife of Frank Uno, who was bound that she should not break her engagement with him.

The girl has been in this country only two months. Mutual friends arranged for her to marry Uno, and she agreed to marry him, and she took the clothes and refused to give Uno either the finery or the affections. He had her arrested for false pretense, and kept her in jail over a week. She finally agreed to marry him and secure her liberty.

LOST HER HUSBAND BEFORE SHE MET HIM.

London, Nov. 13.—The sad and extraordinary position of a woman being a widow before she is a wife, says the Johannesburg Standard, is that held by Mrs. L. G. Koops. A few days before Mr. Koops' deeply-regretted death he was married by the hands of a Dutch minister to the lady in Holland. She was to have left to join her husband on the 12th inst., but the cables have apprised her of her misfortune.

The system of marriage by proxy is frequently adopted by bridegrooms in South Africa and Dutch brides in Holland. A friend of the groom represents him in the church, and he is only released from the solemn engagement by a saving clause in the certificate. The an object of these innocent mock marriages is to bind the far-away husband to his contract.

PATTI'S PENCHANT.

London, Nov. 13.—Mme. Adelina Patti-Nicolini announces her betrothal to the Baron Cederstrom, a Swedish nobleman. The marriage will take place next February.

Should Mme. Patti-Nicolini marry again it will surprise many of her admirers. Her whole life seemed to be bound up in Signor Nicolini, who died only last January, and for whom she sacrificed a great social position. Her husband's marriage was a brilliant one. The marriage of Signor Nicolini being the bridegroom in a wedding ceremony in

London, July 29, 1868, which marked the success of a pet scheme of the Empress Eugenie. Differences in age and temperament, however, caused an estrangement in a few years, and the great singer, at the height of her career, bestowed her affections to Signor Nicolini, who sang Romeo to her Juliet. Their love was shown even on the stage, and aristocratic women refused to recognize her. She had been devoted to the tenor singer for almost ten years when the Marquis de Caux obtained a divorce from her in 1884. Signor Nicolini was also divorced from his wife, and they were married in a little Protestant chapel near Mrs. Patti's Welsh castle, on June 9, 1896. The devotion of the singers to one another until death separated them served as the basis of many pretty stories.

POLITICAL POINTS

By an arrangement between the parties, petitions against the return of 26 members of the British Columbia Provincial Legislature have been formally dismissed by Justice Martin.

Two election petitions were disposed of on Thursday at Osgoode Hall, North Hastings and North Toronto. Both were dismissed. In the case of North Hastings, however, W. J. Allen, the member, has resigned his seat. Both are Conservatives. This makes eight vacancies in the legislature.

G. F. Marter is confirmed in his seat as member for North Toronto.
