

#### GERMANS USE TANKS IN DRIVE ON VILLERS.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, April 24—2 p.m.—By The Associated Press—Hard fighting developed this morning on the southern battle front, the enemy attacking south of the Somme along the line of Villers—Bretonneux, Hangard—en—Santerre Hailles and Castel.

The assault was preceded by a heavy bombardment about Villers-Bretonneux At the conclusion of this preparation, the Germans surged forward along the whole British front south of the Sommalthough it seemed evident that they had Villers-Bretonneux as their ultimate goal, because of its dominating position.

In the face of heavy machine-gun and rifle fire the Germans pushed on toward the town, their three tanks leading.
