JUST LIKE RUSSIA

Home of Deputy and His Desk in Parliament Ransacked.

Berlin, Aug. 14.—Herr Erzberger, a member of the Reichstag, who has made himself obnoxious to the authorities as an exposé of colonial abuses in Africa, is being treated with scant consideration by the police. His apartments here in Berlin have been searched for papers and documents which would enable the authorities to see from whom he obtained his information, and his desk in the Reichstag has also been rummaged with a similar object. From both places quite a number of documents have been taken.

Herr Erzberger claims immunity from such treatment as a member of the Reichstag. The fact that the Reichstag car, by entering the Berlin police and the papers of members admitted creates an uneasy feeling here and makes people feel that, after all, Berlin is not so far away from the Russian frontier.

The Government is conducting strict investigations into the abuses of the colonial office. It recently came to light that certain Berlin newspapers were being supplied with confidential information, and Herr Erzberger also is believed by the authorities to have been in communication with subordinate officials of this department.

City Officials Must Not Mix in Private Business

Manufacturers' Committee Opposed to Proposal of International Electric Co.

The manufacturers' committee of yesterday afternoon, and refused to adopt a proposal submitted by the International Electrical Company to the effect that the city auditor and city solicitor should investigate the affairs of the concern, and, if things were found all right, sign a statement setting forth that the company is a good financial proposition.

Instead, the committee submitted a motion stating that the city auditor and city solicitor may investigate and sign the statement proposed by Mr. Sifton, but they must not do so as city officials.

Mr. Sifton's proposition was couched in the form of a motion, and was as follows:

"We, the undersigned members of the manufacturers' committee, of the city of London, being a special committee to report on the International Electric Company, Limited, beg to report as follows:

"We have examined the properties, plant and merchandise of the said company, and believe it to be carefully and reasonably valued. We believe the business of electric manufacturing to be capable of unlimited expansion.

"We have noticed the size and class of contracts handled, and we have concluded that it is advisable to have a

considerable increase of capital to properly finance and carry on to an even greater profit the business which they have in hand. We have examined their prospectus and find the statements therein to be reasonably and conservatively estimated. Our auditor has examined the books and statements of the company, and finds them carefully and correctly kept. Our solicitor has examined the legal standing of the company from its inception and reports favorably.

"We beg, therefore, to recommend this company's stock to the citizens of London and vicinity as a reliable and safe investment, and worthy of their best support and interests."

The following motion was substituted by the committee:

"That this committee congratulate the International Construction Company, Limited, on the report in the public press, stating that they have had a very successful year, and are about to declare a dividend of 10 per cent, with a substantial balance also, placed to the reserved funds of the company.

"The committee also has no objection to the company employing the services of the city auditor and city auditor to investigate their books, but this must be done with them as private individuals, and not in their capacity of city officials.

"The committee regret that they cannot grant the request of the company, as they think it unwise to create the precedent of taking the responsibility of vouching for the accuracy of the statements of private firms."
