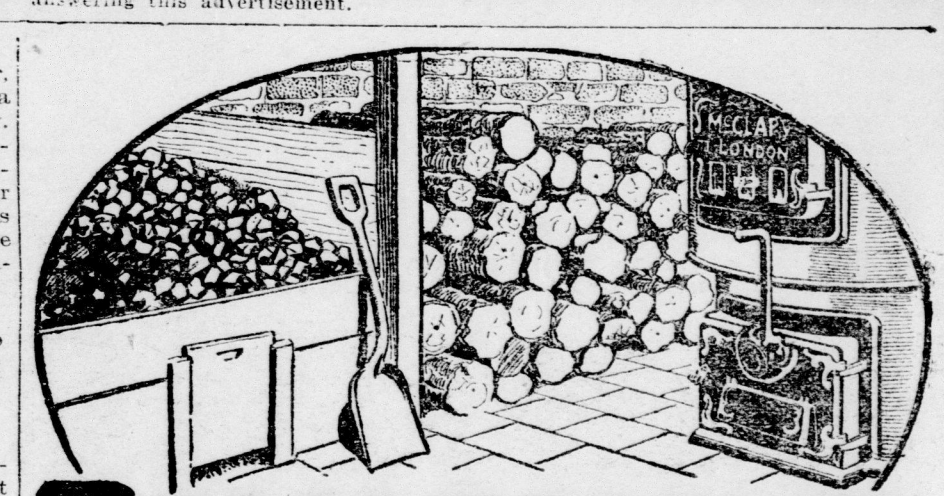

The lowest temperature yet recorded is that reached recently by K. Olszewski in an attempt to liquefy helium. By the aid of solid hydrogen he cooled the gas to -259 degrees C., under 180 atmospheres' pressure; then, suddenly releasing the pressure to that of the atmosphere, a degree of cold was created, which, by calculation from Laplace and Poisson's formula, amounted to -273.8 degrees C. Helium, however, did not liquefy, and he accordingly assumes that its boiling point must be below -271, and that there is little prospect of reducing it to a liquid.

A German investigator, Weichardt, has promulgated the theory that fatigue is the direct result of a poison manufactured by the system and developed by hard work, and requiring rest to drive it out. Weichardt experimented with the muscle juice of guinea pigs which he had previously fatigued, and his examination proved that this juice acted as a veritable poison similar to some of the well-known toxins. By inoculating other animals he produced symptoms of fatigue and large doses produced death.
