It is proposed to increase the insurance of the City Hall, Hamilton, from \$85,000 to \$100,000.

Bishop Williams of Huron held confirmation services at Port Stanley, St. Thomas and Aylmer yesterday.

Mrs. George Atkin, of Galt, fell down cellar yesterday, and as she is 79 years old, her recovery is doubtful.

Richard Davis, a farmer of Chilli-wack, B. C., was struck by a bullet fired by a Chinaman and may die.

Dr. Unsworth, of the Mountain Samaritan, Hamilton, has resigned to take a course of special study in Europe.

A car of the Ottawa Electric Railway Company was burned yesterday on a siding, and the loss is assessed at \$3,000.

Peterboro water commissioners report a surplus of \$7,520.43, and that over 20 miles of pipes were laid in 1907.

St. Thomas citizens may keep the wood of trees cut in front of their houses, while the city removes the brush.

Michael S. Sanders, engineer in Richard Heay's sawmill at Kamsack, was caught in a belt on Saturday and killed.

Niagara Falls has a story that the C. N. R. has secured the right of way of the Toronto and Niagara Power Company.

The annual meeting of the South-west and Dunwich Telephone Association will take place at Iona Station on Wednesday.

Dr. Parkin, who is in Montreal, reports that a number of United States universities have decided to adopt the Oxford system.

An ice jam blocks the St. Lawrence at the foot of the Cornwall canal, and the St. Lawrence cotton mills is flooded and closed down.

The large sawmill in course of construction at Jacques River, and owned by the Lawson Lumber Company, was burned on Sunday.

Two engines, a snowplow and 135 men on the Guelph and Goderich Railway are working in the snow somewhere near Walton.

Fernand Berger, now in Boston, will be extradited to Montreal, where he is alleged to have victimized citizens to the extent of \$25,000.

The Dominion Government steamer Argus drifted from her moorings at Dartmouth, N. S., and is high and dry on the shore, with funnel missing and badly damaged.

The Windsor, Essex and Lake Shore Rapid Railway Company shares will meet on March 2 to sanction the issuing of \$60,000 more bonds to complete the railroad to Leamington.

A movement is on foot in Toronto to unseat Mayor Oliver, Controllers Hocutt and Hadden, and Ald. Keeler, J. J. Graham and Hiley, were instrumental in bringing in the liquor license reduction bill.

It is stated that Rev. Father Lavallee has been appointed from Rome to be the new superior general of the Oblate Order. This district comprises the whole of the Canadian west. The new appointee is one of the best-known of the French clergy.

Chief Parnell, of St. Catharines, went to Buffalo to bring home a burglar captured there, but when he found that he was an escaped inmate of the Brockville asylum he refused to take him. The United States authorities say they will deport him.

Squire Smith handed out heavy fines to Wm. Frazer and Patrick Buckley, of McMillan Township, yesterday. The men were charged with creating a disturbance on a Grand Trunk train, in which they assaulted a passenger and damaged the car somewhat. Frazer's fines on three charges aggregated \$95, while Buckley's amounted to about \$75.

Chicago, Feb. 5.—The Pullman Company today mailed checks for \$175,000 to employees as an expression of gratitude for courtesy to the traveling public in 1907. The checks went to 1,153 conductors and 2,517 porters, a month's pay to each man.

The Pullman Company employs 535 conductors and 1,783 porters who get no checks.

Every man who receives an extra month's pay is on the "roll of honor." The system will be continued in 1908.

BRAVE PRIVATE
SAVED AMELIE

Grappled With Assassin as He Was About To Shoot the Queen.

Lisbon, Feb. 4.—The identity of the third dead assassin has been established. He was a Spaniard named Cordova. This man was partially identified soon after the tragedy, and his identification now has been confirmed.

From an account given by an eyewitness it appears that the queen owes her life to the courage of a soldier who grappled with Buica as he was taking careful aim at her, leaning his carbine against the colonnade.

The assassin fought desperately to accomplish his purpose. Apparently there was an interval between the shooting of the king and the crown prince, during which the queen was trying to push her way off the quay.

Suddenly Buica stepped out from behind the colonnade, a short distance from the street, and shot the prince. He then prepared to take off the queen.

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TWO BIG FIRES

Berlin, N. H., Feb. 5.—Two separate fires in the business section of this town today were controlled after five hours, causing damage estimated at \$400,000. The Green block, in which the first blaze originated, which was occupied by business houses, as well as the sheltering some forty tenants, and the Berlin National Bank, were destroyed by fire at the lower end of the town, which was the first; and six tenement buildings, several blocks up Main street, were burned to the ground by the second fire. The two fires, burning at each end of the business section, alarmed the local officials, and help was summoned from Portland and Lewiston, Me. The help from these places was responsible for the early mastery over the flames, as the local department was unable to cope with the fire to any great extent. The telephone exchange was deserted by the operators some time after the flames reached the Green block, in which it was located, and although service was interrupted during the night, it was resumed early today.
