1917 YEAR OF PRIVATION IS A BERLIN REPORT

Disappointing Potato Crop Offsets Increase in Grain Is Official Admission.

RATIONS INCREASE

Pessimistic Outlook for Year Sent Out by Sayville Wireless to Associated Press.

Berlin, Jan. 2 .- Via Sayville Wireless to the Associated Press; The new year, as far as internal conditions are concerned, will be a year of privation. The increased harvest of grains is offset by a disappointing potato crop, so that, despite the food supplies captured In Rumania, no prospect of an in-crease in the total ration can be held out for the present, though perhaps later it may be found pos sible to provide an extra allowance of meat. Dietary experts declare, however, that the present ration is entirely adequate to support life and maintain working vigor, except in the case of those occupied in heavy work, for whom special pro-vision is now being made under the appeal of Field Marshal von Hin-denburg, chief of the general staff to the rural population for contrib utions. It is maintained that while life within the blockade may pos sibly become increasingly unpleasant, the military efficiency Germany will not be diminished.

OF PRESENT WAR, SAY ALLIES Answer American Note by Declaring Peace Negotiations That Will End World War Will Pave Way For It -Speedy Reply Now Assured.

THROUGH PROPER CONCLUSION

London, Jan. 2 .- The final draft of the reply of the Entente to President Wlison's peace note, which already has been approved by France and Great Britain, has been forwarded to Italy and Russia, and as no changes have been suggested thus far from these quarters, it is not improbable the note will be delivered to the American ambassador in Paris within a short time. It is understood here that the note may possibly be handed to him tomorrow. However, Belgium made her request at the last moment that the statement of her case be added to the reply of the Central Powers, and similar additions or delays may occur in the case of the note to President Wilson.

In its present form the reply is about the same length as the note to the Central Powers, and has the same characteristics of general and guarded language. One of the most important points is a differentiation between peace among the present belligerrents and such future arrangements as may be made for permanent peace, the purpose being to show neutral upholders of a future permanent peace that this is attainable, not alone by first concluding the present war, but also by concluding the kind of a peace which will pave the way for a permanent peace.

While the original draft, like the reply to the Central Powers, was written largely in France, Foreign Secretary Balfour also has had a considerable part in it, particularly in regard to phrases seeking to elucidate the situation for the benefit of public opinion in neutral countries.
