

PERU AND CHILE STILL LONG WAY FROM BEING ON FRIENDLY TERMS

Peruvian Cabinet Approves of
Strong Protest Against
Riots.

TO DEMAND INDEMNITIES

Chilean Consul Will Leave
Lima Today, Says a
Dispatch.

LIMA, Peru, Nov. 28.—The cabinet and senate have approved the action of the foreign minister in strongly protesting to Chile against the anti-Peruvian riots at Iquique.

It is understood that Peru will demand indemnities for these incidents. The Entente ministers at Lima called separately upon the foreign minister yesterday.

The Chilean consul here will leave for home late today or tomorrow.

It was reported in dispatches from Santiago and Lima Monday night that Chile and Peru had recalled their respective consuls.

AFFAIR NOT SETTLED.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 28.—No communication has been received from Peru since the protest of the Peruvian foreign minister against anti-Peruvian riots at Iquique, Chile, and attacks on Peruvian consuls, it was said at the foreign office today.

It was added that the announcement of Carlos Castro Ruiz, Chilean consul in New York, that the difficulty between Peru and Chile had been settled by an apology on the part of the Peruvian Government, was evidently due to a misunderstanding.

OTTAWA ATTACHES TOO MANY STRINGS TO SUIT THE WEST

Concessions Offered Are Not
Worth Accepting.

MOTHERWELL, INDIGNANT

Acceptance Would Leave the
Question of Natural Resources Unsolved.

REGINA, Nov. 28.—"The Dominion Government, even if it has decided to return to the western provinces their natural resources, attached so many strings that it seems scarcely worth while bothering further with the problem at present," was the statement made today by Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture for Saskatchewan, on his return from Ottawa.

Certain important reservations, which were stated by Hon. Arthur Meighen, include:

The administration of the school endowment; the retention by the Dominion Government of all public parks; the retention of all forest reserves; the retention of all waterways, and the right to supply the railways from the coal resources of the province, coal areas to be reserved for this purpose.

Mr. Motherwell pointed out that after these reservations had been made there was little or nothing left except the agricultural lands, timber areas and some coal mines, of which the best had already been alienated from the province.

The reservations stipulated by Mr. Meighen, said Mr. Motherwell, were of such a nature that it would be leaving the question of natural resources unsolved.

DINNER SERVED IN PLANE HALF A MILE UP IN AIR DEDICATES MAIL TERMINUS

Nine Persons Enjoy Thanksgiving Feast During Twenty-Minute Flight—Nation-Wide Mail Service by Air Predicted for United States.

ELIZABETH, N.J., Nov. 28.—The first aerial banquet in history was held today on an airplane, 2,800 feet above the new flying field of the United States air mail service here, marking the inauguration of the field as the terminus of the aerial mail service between New York, Philadelphia and Washington.

A few minutes after the mail plane, in charge of Pilot Max Miller, left the field at 12:10 P.M. afternoon, a big Hadley-Pago machine rose under control of Capt. E. B. Waller of the Royal flying forces, and during a flight of 22 minutes above the grounds a real Thanksgiving dinner was served to nine persons.

Among the guests were Capt. Benjamin B. Lipsner, superintendent of the air mail service, and Allan R. Hawtry, Augustus Post and other officials of the Aero Club of America.

Speaking of the proposed nation-wide extension of the mail service Captain Lipsner said: "We will have machines which will carry a ton and a-half of mail, and the days of freight and parcel post by airplane are coming."

BRITISH REACH GERMAN BORDER BEYOND BELGIUM

Since Armistice Was Signed
1,400 Guns Are
Taken.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—Advance guards of the British troops have reached the German-German frontier in the region between Heho and Stavelot, and are in possession of more than 1,400 surrendered German guns, according to an official communication issued tonight.

The text of the communication follows:

"Our forward troops have reached the German frontier between the neighborhood of Heho and Stavelot. The number of German guns which have passed into our possession since November 11 exceeds 1,400."

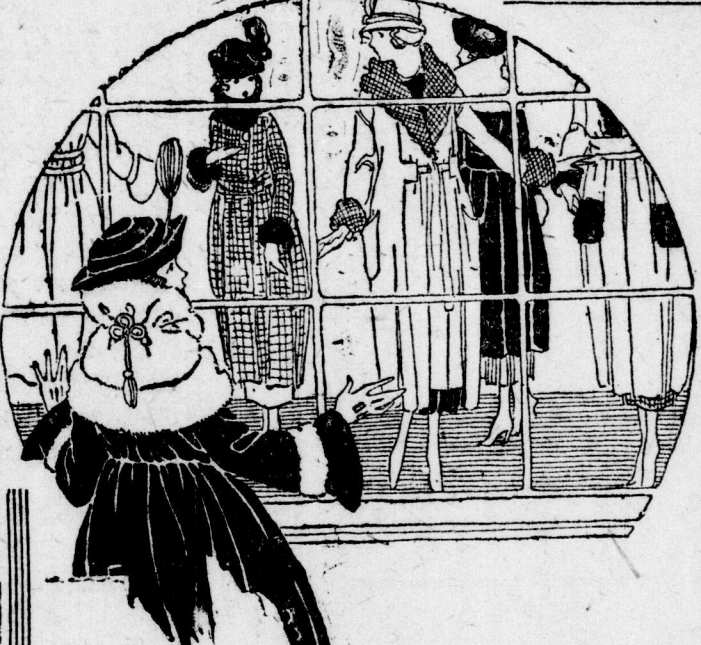
