

FARMER-LABOR GROUP AGREES ON NOMINATIONS

Parties Reach Understanding Regarding Placing Candidates.

Morrison Issues Statement About Method of Picking Candidates.

TORONTO, July 22.—An understanding between the United Farmers of Ontario and the Independent Labor Party on the question of putting candidates in the field was arrived at in this city on Monday at a joint conference, according to an official statement issued tonight by J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario. The statement is embodied in a resolution that was passed at the meeting in question, and is as follows:

"Whereas agriculture and labor are by common economic and educational interests being drawn more and more closely together, and whereas by reason of legislation enacted in the Provincial Houses of Parliament and laws made at the Dominion House at Ottawa affecting their interests very closely, they have been led to unite their forces for political action, and whereas their aim at promoting the greatest degree of freedom in the choice of representatives consistent with effective effort, therefore it is desirable that in the selection of candidates in constituencies, which are urban and rural, be chosen from the two parties, and that the proportion of delegates sent by each be decided at a conference of the local executive within the riding."

ELECTRIC SERVICE RATES ADVANCED 34 PER CENT IN WINDSOR

Customers of S., W. and A. Company Power Plant Are Notified.

COST OF COAL CAUSE Plant Now Under Control of Hydro-Electric Commission.

WINDSOR, July 22.—An advance in the power rates of 34 per cent to the 2,500 users subscribing for service from the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway Company plant recently acquired by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission with the purchase of the street railway system, was announced today by Oliver M. Perry, general manager of the Windsor hydro-electric system. The increase, however, is only of a temporary nature and will remain in effect only until such time as the Chippewa Creek development of provincial commission is completed, after which the consumers will be switched to the provincial hydro lines. Increased cost of coal from which the electrical energy is generated, is given as the reason for boosting the schedule of rates.

SASKATCHEWAN GETS MILLION-DOLLAR RAIN; CROP NOW ASSURED

REGINA, Sask., July 22.—Saskatchewan's "million-dollar rain" came today, and the crop throughout the province is now assured. From wide-flung parts of the province reports have been received of heavy rainfall, with consequent beneficial results to the crops. In many districts where the hot sun of the last two weeks was burning up the crops the situation has been eased by yesterday's downpour and yields running from feed up to 39 bushels are looked for.

TENDERS FOR NEW HOTEL AT WINDSOR SKY HIGH

WINDSOR, July 22.—"Sky high" like the New Prince Edward Hotel, were all the bids from contractors figuring on the work, which were opened at a meeting of local men interested in the project with the officials of the United Hotels Company from Toronto and New York today.

Tenders submitted and opened at today's session practically all exceeded the original estimates to a considerable degree, but although no contracts were let, as was intended, Frank A. Dudley, president of the United Hotels Company, declared this would be done next Monday.

George H. O'Neill, general manager of the Canadian interests of the company, said that after looking over the situation here he was convinced nothing was so badly required as a modern, well-equipped hotel, and that as soon as possible the construction work would commence, probably on August 1st.

The building, he said, would be erected originally with nine stories, 250 rooms, cafeteria, dining-room and assembly hall of sufficient size to accommodate 700 delegates to convention. The plans provide for an extension of three stories and 100 additional rooms as soon as required.

MILITARY HONORS. WINDSOR, July 22.—Full military honors will be accorded the remains of Thomas Ford, first contingent veteran, whose mangled body was found this week on the Grand Trunk tracks between Windsor and Tecumseh, when the funeral is held from Walkerville to Windsor, Grove Cemetery, Saturday afternoon. Deceased, who is a native of Scotland, had been in Canada but a few weeks when war broke out, and he enlisted immediately. Coroner Polson of Tecumseh conducted an inquest tonight.

CLAIM TIME ALLOWANCE. WINDSOR, July 22.—Admitting guilt to two charges of selling liquor, 123 cases in one instance and 60 in the other, Fred Rocheleau and Dennis Rocheleau, through their counsel, in Windsor police court today claimed immunity from conviction because of the sale having been made over three months ago. This circumstance, they claim, under statutes, places them within the law.

LITTLE LOUDER, PLEASE

ST. JOHNS, Nfld., July 22.—Experts from the Marconi Wireless Company who are here conducting experiments in long distance telephonic communication announced today that yesterday they heard messages from the Chelmsford station near London, more than 2,000 miles distant.

They said that they recognized the voice of Captain Round, the expert in charge and identified several words, but failed to pick up any connected sentence.

SHEEP-RAISING. Sheep raising is perhaps the oldest of all industries, for it was practiced even before agriculture. Wool is a product of cultivation or domestication, for there are no wild animals which closely resemble the wool-bearing sheep. Floyd W. Parsons, in the Saturday Evening Post, says that with the discovery that cloth could be made from wool came an effort to improve the fleece by selection and breeding. The early Romans were most successful in this pursuit, and their endeavors along this line resulted in developing a fleece of great fineness. After the conquest of the Iberian Peninsula, Roman sheep were introduced into Spain, where they so greatly improved the native flocks that even during Roman supremacy Spanish wool led the world's markets, a prestige held for many centuries.



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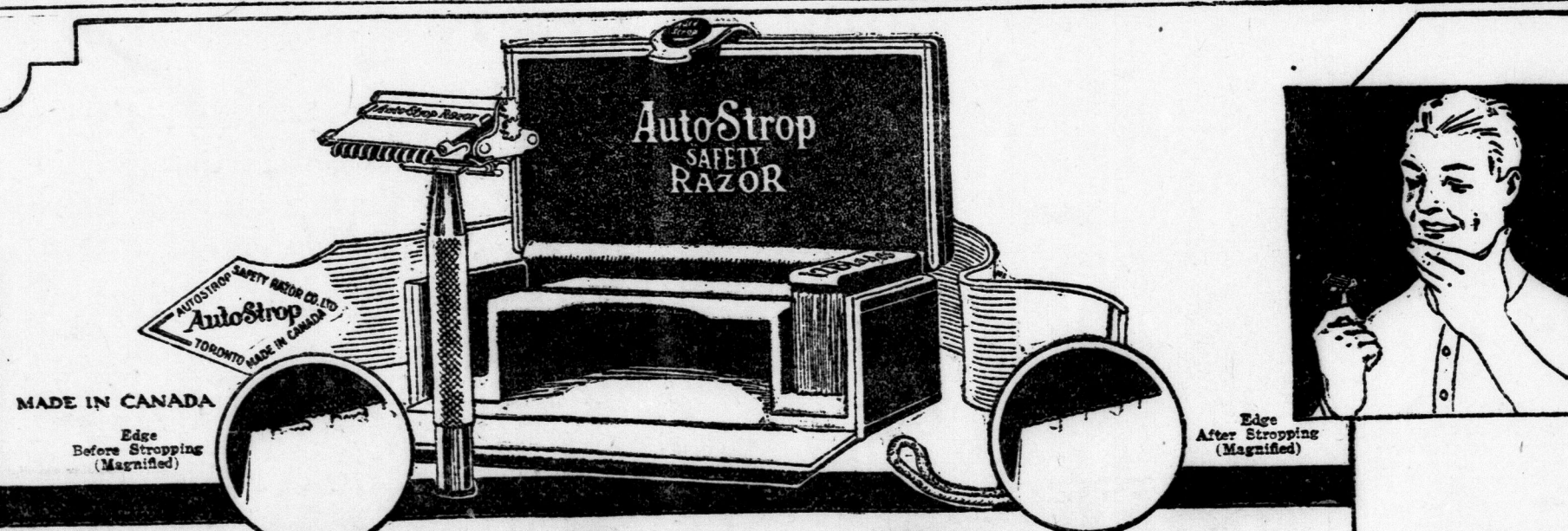
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No Longer May Girls Clad In Scant Attire Dance Gaily Behind Footlights In France

Paris, July 17.—Nudity on the French stage never will be permitted again. This fact has been added in the senate when M. de Lamarzelle interpolated M. Steeg, minister of the interior, and X. Lhopiteau, guardian of the seals, on questions of public decency.

M. de Lamarzelle was supported by Senator du Morbihan and by Hugues le Roux, personal friend of Col. House and President Wilson. They demanded the stage be cleansed of suggestive lines and costumes, theatrical billposters censored, movie films regulated and "peep shows" inspected by the police.

When M. de Lamarzelle thundered forth that French prestige suffered seriously from the pornographic displays at certain theatres and music halls, and that tourists would leave France with lowered opinion of the French people because of what they had seen in amusement places, he was greeted with rounds of applause.

France has not been saved from disaster in the great war to be delivered up to the minority of pornography purveyors that you stigmatize," shouted Hugues le Roux, and another burst of cheers greeted that remark.

Certain French managers have been becoming more and more licentious in their productions, said M. de Lamarzelle. He called attention to the suggestive titles of plays, such as "The Bedroom of the Ingenues," produced recently at the notorious Concert Marol, and the new revue there entitled "The Convent of Carcasses."

"Love Gone Mad," at the Polles Berger, and other titles were mentioned as too suggestive by the senator.

He also scored the bill posters displayed by certain theatres. Most of these posters represent scantily-clad women, some of them in daring poses, and bear slangy, suggestive phrases.

Then M. de Lamarzelle attacked some of the scenes now being presented in Paris theatres. He said certain managers were following a systematic scheme in reducing the costumes of actresses more and more with each new production.

Finally he demanded: "Are we going to permit the nude again on the French stage?"

The senators replied with a volley of "Noes" from all sides, and effectively settled that point.
