## Morningstar Wins Sutton Second Money in Billiard Tourney

NEW YORK, April 2.—Ora Morningstar of this city is the new world's champion at 182 ball line billiards, having won the honor by defeating George F. Slosson in the final game of the international tournament at the Madison Square Garden concert hall to-night. Morningstar is a native of Indiana. He is 34 years old and has been prominent as a short-stop player for several years. His first attempt in billiards was in the international tournament three years ago, when he finished far down in the line. But this year he distinguished himself by scoring a victory in every one of his six games. He was the only one to win an international tournament for ten years past. In addition to winning the championship emblem, Morningstar gets a cash prize of \$250 and 40 per cent. of the gate receipts and entry money.

George Sutton of Chicago gets second prize, 25 per cent. of the money, while George F. Slosson of New York, and A. C. Cunniff of Boston, tied for third place and divide 27 per cent. Louis Cure of Paris, champion of France, will receive the remainder. Calvin Demarest of Chicago and H. P. Cline of Philadelphia won one game each out of the six played.

The most tedious game of the tournament was the afternoon contest between A. G. Cutler of Boston and Calvin Demarest of Chicago. It lasted 47 innings and resulted in a victory for Cutler by 500 to 27.
