

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WHOLESALE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

Big Shipments of Peaches Continue to Come to Market.

The wholesale fruit market at the foot of Scott street continues to be one of the busiest places in the city, notwithstanding that business some days, like yesterday, for instance, was anything but brisk. Receipts of all kinds of domestic fruit were yesterday more than ordinarily heavy, or appeared to be, but this was due in a measure to the fact that arrivals were late getting in owing to the fog on the lake holding up traffic. Heavy deliveries of peaches came in yesterday, and judging from what the commission houses say, large quantities are still available for local use, in striking contrast to last year.

There is no over-supply of grapes coming on the market, the growers having, it is said, a good market across the line and since prices are not likely to come off very much. Blue and white grapes are quoted at from 42c to 45c and red Robert at 45c, with six-quart baskets of peaches selling from 45c for 12c and 11-quart lenos from 40c to 75c; peaches, 50c to 75c on the 11-quart; apricot, 1-quart basket, 50c; pickling onions, 60c to 75c for the 11-quart; quinces, 40c to 75c for the 11-quart; and chestnuts, 25c a lb. There are a few of the most commonly known fruits, and will serve to give some idea of the general prices.

We submit the quotations of the leading wholesale firms on the exchange, with the prices: The meeting of the board of commerce order regarding sugar, and which was generally known in the wholesale market during the afternoon, was hailed with satisfaction, and the opinion expressed that the government was doing no more than their plain duty in the matter. The order came pretty late to have much effect upon the fruit trade, but it was said that it would have some effect.
