This design shows a house which strikes the eye as novel and original in style, though of the English type and most attractive and convenient.

The groups of windows, with their timbered framing, the high pitched roof and sharp dormers, are quite unusual, and yet there is not a hint of extravagance about the whole.

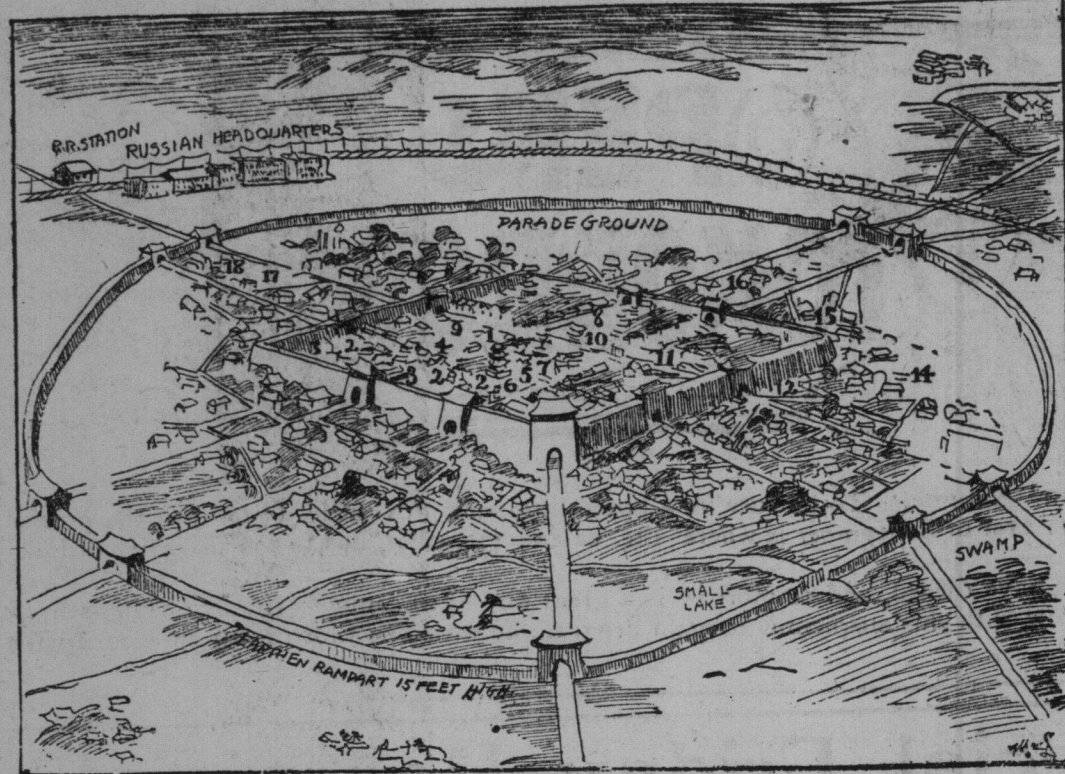
From the square-shaped porch we enter a large reception hall, with a fireplace built at the side. There is a very good staircase effect, flat balustrades being built at the side, which allow of plants or ornaments being set on them. There is a curtain at the turn of the stairs and under the stairs a coal closet.

The ceiling of this room may be beamed. The parlor is a good, square room, with artistic windows, and back of it is the library, with its pretty inglenook and deep-seated bay, with bookshelves between seat and wall. A most charming effect can be secured here, the library being finished with the entrance to the hall is a staircase, with a simulated column, which is stained a deep red color. It may be stained any desired effect. The dining room is of a very fair size, with a pretty corner effect. It is connected with the kitchen by a good pantry. The kitchen is well arranged and can have stationary sinks between windows and door if so desired.

On the second floor are five bedrooms, with excellent closets in each, and a large store closet off the back porch, which can be made into a private bath if so desired, or used for linen closet, or as a dressing-room off the front room, connected with the bath, which is large enough for a bedroom for a child. This second floor would divide excellently well into two suites, with private baths for two families.

There is space for two rooms in the attic, and in most places these could be built with little cost. The house is of a panelling rather heavy. Roof shingled. The color of the house would depend on the surroundings. White, with brown trim and a red roof would have an excellent effect. Ceilings are 9 feet and 8 feet 6 inches. Width, 32 feet 6 inches. Depth, 48 feet, without the rear porch.

Engagement Expected Soon at Mukden Kuropatkin Prepares to Resist Japs

Tokio, Sept. 21.—An impression is growing general that an engagement will soon take place at Mukden. Gen. Kuropatkin is evidently preparing to make a determined resistance to any attempt to dispossess him and in consequence constructing defenses, trenching and constructing defenses. He has an immense force available, but the opinion is expressed that the Pass would be a more favorable location for defense. The Russians, however, are unwilling to suffer the loss of prestige which would be involved by the abandonment of Mukden. Both armies are now rested and have recovered from the effects of the fight at Liaoyang.

A telegram received to-day from military headquarters in Manchuria says that portions of the Russian troops engaged in reconnaissance while returning from Pingtialze continued in touch with the Japanese lines along the Mukden and Fushun roads on Sept. 15. There was no fighting.

Russians Doubt It.
St. Petersburg, Sept. 21.—While the despatches to the war office do not indicate that Field Marshal Oyama's main armies have yet resumed their forward movement, advance detachments of Japanese are feeling out the strength and disposition of the Russian forces and Japanese flanking columns are already pressing northward.

The reports that a battle at Mukden is imminent are, however, regarded as premature. All that seems to be definitely established is that Oyama is again essaying to flank Gen. Kuropatkin from the east. His advance forces are seeking to obtain command of the roads leading toward thirty miles east of Mukden. Yesterday they attempted to seize Tie Pass, on the road to Fushun, in order to turn the Russian left, but they were repulsed. In addition to the two Russian corps already mobilized, seven other corps are to be called to the colors. The reports that Gen. Kuropatkin had crossed the Hun River at Fushun turn out to be false. The Russians are still holding the road to Fushun and Bentzputze. It is pointed out that if the Japanese had occupied Fushun and Bentzputze, they would have been compelled to evacuate Mukden, since Fushun is nearer to Tie Pass.
