every way litted to supply the place of and in the rear of the The Managers have decided to purchase a piece of land in the rear of the Home from Mr. Baldwin, and have offered the sum of \$1,000 for it, through their solicitor; which will enable the Matron to keep the boys employed in gardening; thus teaching them habits of industry, and making them fit to labor after leaving the Home. The fence around the Institution being very much out of repair, the Managers considered it necessary to erect a new one, which is nearly completed. And as soon as funds can be obtained the additional piece of ground will be enclosed.
