BASEBALL.
Declines to Meet Giants.
New York, Nov. 12.—President Comiskey of the world's champion White Sox has declined an invitation from Manager McGraw of the Giants to play a series of exhibition games in the south next spring.
The Detroit Tigers also have refused to play the Giants in March. It will be recalled that during the battles last spring between McGraw and Jennings there was a rumour, in which Cobb spiked Herzog and then refused to take part in the remaining games. GAELIC AMERICAN IS BEING INVESTIGATED
Has Been Attacking U. S. Secret Service — Says it Uses Fakes Supplied by England
New York, Nov. 14.—The Gaelic American, a Sinn Fein weekly published in New York, of which John Devoy is editor, is under investigation by the federal authorities. The last issue of the paper devoted most of its space to attacks on the United States secret service, which, it charges, is working in the interest of England, while William J. Flynn, the chief of the service, is referred to, not once, but several times, as the author of "impudent fakes" and as a common liar. Since the passage of the Espionage Act the paper has ceased printing attacks upon President Wilson, which featured its editorial columns prior to this country's entrance into the war.
The attacks on the secret service are made as a result of the arrest by the secret service of Sinn Fein leaders, "General" Liam Mellows and Dr. Patrick McCartan, who escaped to this country after the Dublin Sinn Fein riots of Easter, 1916, and who recently sought to get back to Ireland. Mellows is now out on bail.
The purpose of the local Sinn Feiners, in the opinion of federal officials, is primarily to discredit, if possible, the secret service in the eyes of the American people and to cast doubt, in advance, on the truthfulness of any disclosures which the government may see fit to make regarding the activities in this country of Sinn Feiners and their German sympathizers.
The case of Mellows is said to be before the federal grand jury now, and rumor has it that the activities of Irish besides Mellows, the number including some who are American citizens of Irish extraction, will soon be brought to the attention of the grand jury of this district.
