CARDINAL BOURNE SUPPORTS CABINET IN FIGHTING STRIKE

LONDON, May 10.—No pronouncement during the week end in connection with the general strike created a greater impression than that delivered by His Eminence Cardinal Francis Bourne, Archbishop of Westminster, at the high mass in Westminster Cathedral yesterday morning.

Following is a verbatim report of Cardinal Bourne's deliverance: "The time through which we are passing is of an exceptional character and the present strike is of a nature quite unlike any other which preceded it. It is necessary that Catholics should have clearly before their minds the moral principles involved."

"First, there is no moral justification for a general strike of this character. It is a direct challenge to lawfully constituted authority and is in itself a sin. It is the duty of all to pray earnestly and constantly for His guidance that the day may be hastened when these unhappy conflicts shall terminate in a just and lasting peace."

provision is an experiment now being carried on by J. Morris Robinson and Walter Harrison in a region back of Rothesay, where they have placed Hungarian partridge and Mongolian pheasants in the hope that these birds will multiply and to a great extent take the place of native partridge, grouse which have mysteriously disappeared to an amazing percentage in the past two seasons.

Mr. Robinson stated to a Times-Star reporter this morning that he had secured the imported birds from a game farm in Pennsylvania. He has three trios of each species and they have already mated and set up their little nest-homes in locations known and unknown. The uncertainty concerning the perpetuation of the birds in this climate is the possibility of the newcomers securing food through the deep snows of winter time. If this difficulty is not too great, it is a fairly safe assumption the Hungarian partridge and Mongolian pheasant will survive and multiply.

IN NOVA SCOTIA TOO.

The Hungarian partridge is a Bohemian bird in nativity, one of the game delights for gunner and table in mid-section of Europe. Parties interested in the re-stocking of game preserves on this side of the water inspired the institution of game farms in several American localities and from these transplanted sources mated birds are being distributed. Colonel Willis of Nova Scotia, has instituted a little farm of the two species of birds mentioned, to which latter place he sent ten of his consignment of Hungarian partridge.

THE PARTRIDGE LOSS.

Mr. Robinson, like other students of woodland life as an enthusiastic game hunter, has no definite theory to advance relative to the partridge disappearance. The idea that a disease or loss was carrying them off has not found ready acceptance. He is still a theory with no particular proof. There may be something in the observation of a New Brunswick guide who journeyed in the Quebec woods the past two winters. He relates finding many partridge nests filled with frozen eggs.

ARE HAWKS CULPRITS?

Mr. Robinson leans to the supposition that murderous hawks may have something to do with the death of partridge of late. Usually the vulture preys upon rabbits but it is known that a raptorial disease which seems to move in 7-year cycles has been killing off the little creatures for generations of our fellow countrymen. It is therefore a sin against the obedience we owe to God and against the charity and brotherly love due our brethren."
