Climbs Rope to Chimney Top and Saves Riveter Overcome by Gas.

New York, Jan. 31.—Climbing hand over hand up a rope fastened to the top of a chimney at a height of nearly seventy-five feet from the ground, Patrolman Charles Busse of the Hunter's Point Precinct made a thrilling rescue when he gained the top and lowered the unconsclous form of Harry Seal of 25 South street, Manhattan, who lay at a perilous angle, overcome by coal gas, on a small scaffold. Seal, who is a riveter, was repairing the metal smokestack on the building of the Walker Motor Company, on the corner of Van Dam street and Nelson avenue, Long Island City, when he was overcome by coal gas escaping through several rivet holes near which he was at work. Seal sank back, head down, suspended in mid-air only by the side ropes of the bo's'n's chair about his hips.

Patrolman Busse was passing the building on his bicycle and saw Seal dangling high above him. He called to him to stop his "funny work" and sit up. When he received no reply he ran into the building and, after notifying the employes, climbed to the roof. The bo's'n's chair was suspended by a rope which ran through a pulley at the top of the smokestack and back to the chair where Seal had made it fast. The loose end dangled down to the roof. By this rope Seal raised and lowered himself.

The patrolman hauled himself up the loose end of the line until he gained the chair. There he unloosed the knot which held up the chair and slowly lowered himself and the unconsclous man to the roof. Seal was treated by Ambulance Surgeon Streitel of the St. John's Hosting Suits


